AMUSEMENTS

At the Eugene theater, Monday, April 3, Henry B. Harris will present Ruth St. Denis in a program combining her dances of ancient Egypt with the most interesting of the Hindu numbers in which she was seen last season. The new dances are founded on the religion and customs of ancient Egypt and are the second in the series of Oriental numbers with Miss St. Denis has in preparation. The dancer is supported by a company of nearly 50 people and a special augmented orchestra will play the incidental music under the direction of Walter Meyrowitz.

The program will be divided into two parts, the first including the Egyptian and the second the Hindu numbers. The opening dance is founded on the famous Feast of Ritenity, when, at the height of the celebration, the Osirian mummy was brought in to remind the holiday-makers that life was short, then came "The Tamboura," which Miss St. Denis dances, to emphasize the joy of life. The second dance is called "The Veil of Isis," and seeks to reveal manifestations of the great trinity of ancient Egypt. "Neth Hathor the Third" dance is entitled "The Dance of Day," and takes place on the sacred plains of Ra. It typifies the rise and fall of ancient Egypt.

For the Hindu numbers Miss St. Denis has decided to include in her program "The Cobra" or dance of the snake-charmer, "The Purda," including "The Spirit of Thee," and "The Nautch Dance." While both series of dances are Oriental in their nature they are so different that the contrast is very marked.

As with the Hindu dances seen last season, the new numbers of ancient Egypt have been staged and mounted with every care for detail and historical accuracy. Both scenery and costumes were made under drawings made under the personal direction of Miss St. Denis in the principal libraries and museums of the world.

There could be no more welcome announcement for the amusement-loving public than the appearance here of "The Old Homestead," at the Eugene theater, Thursday, May 4. The dear old pastoral play itself is by this time so familiar to everyone that any attempt to describe it would be supererogation. The mere mention of the names of Joshua Whitcomb, Cy Prince, Seth Perkins,

Aunt Matilda and Ricketty Ann, is sufficient to bring to mind all of those delightful rural characters, and at the same time arise in the background the pictures of the old farm, the homestead in Swaney, Grace church on Broadway in New York city, and the aristocratic mansion of Henry Hopkins, the metropolitan merchant and millionaire. The company this season is practically the same as last, and the production is said to be perfect in every detail.

NEW BUILDINGS GO

UP AT FLORENCE

Business House and Residences Being Erected—Other News Notes

Excavating was commenced this week by T. C. Saubert for a building on his lot between Dr. Edwards' office and the bank building. It is intended for a business house and will be about 34 by 44 feet on the ground and one story in height. Mr. Saubert informed us that he may rent the building, or he may put in a stock of goods and engage in a business there himself.

E. R. Roberts is building a house on his lots in Chicago addition, just east of George Lookwood's residence. Mr. Roberts intends it for a home for himself and family.

W. T. Roseman is erecting a dwelling on his property in Chicago addition not far from Captain Cox's residence.

The Anvil Arrives

The steamer Anvil came in from Portland Tuesday morning with considerable freight and a good passenger list for Florence.

The vessel made a quicker trip than ever before since she has been on the run. It was only eight days from the time she left here on the way to Bandon till she was back again from the north. The steamer left Portland Saturday evening and stopped at Tillamook and Yaguna on the way down, spending one night at each place.

A New Creamery

An agent of the Klock Produce company of Portland was in this vicinity contracting for the purchase of cream for his company. He secured considerable and yesterday morning two wagonloads of cream left Mapleton for Junction City, from which place it will be shipped to Portland.

We understand the company are thinking of establishing a creamery somewhere in this vicinity.

Small Items

The Wachetore went to sea Wednesday morning with a load of lumber from the Siuslaw Lumber Co.'s mill. This is the first cargo shipped out from the Acme mills this spring.

The schooner Coquille, which has been lying at Acme during the winter, is again to engage in carrying lumber between the Siuslaw and San Francisco. She will take out a cargo from Saubert's mill at Acme as soon as she can be made ready for the trip.

The next regular meeting of the Siuslaw Fruitgrowers' association will be held in Florence on Saturday, May 6, 1911.

W. K. Newell, president of the Oregon Horticultural society, and Chas. A. Parks, of Salem, the commissioner for this district, are expected to be present and deliver addresses of interest to fruit growers.

The buds on some of the rhododendron bushes are opening enough to show the bright colors of these beautiful flowers. In a few weeks more all the hills about Florence will be one vast flower garden.—Florence West.

The Blackley and Deedwood stage, leaving the Fish livery barn at Junction Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, will be extended to Mapleton May 1 to connect with boat service to Florence.
