WILL SOON BE BUILT

Guard's Story Several Weeks Ago Confirmed by S. P. Agent Gillette Today

The Guard's exclusive story that the Southern Pacific company would erect a new freight depot in Eugene this spring is about to be confirmed. Agent Gillette today said that work will begin on the structure in a very short time. The old freight depot will be worked over and a 100-foot addition will be erected on the east, making a building 220 feet long, probably large enough for a few years to come.
