STANLEY STORE IS SOLD TO V. W. WINCHELL

Well-Known Eugene Mercantile
House Changes Hands
This Week

Stanley's store has changed hands,
George C. Stanley having sold the
entire stock and business to V. W.
Winchell, of San Francisco.

Stanley's store was established in
Eugene about eight years ago and
has grown from a small concern to
one of Eugene's largest and best
stores. Geo. E. Stanley, the retiring
owner, expects to continue his residence
in Eugene, but will soon leave
with his family for an extended trip
through California.

Mr. Winchell, the new proprietor,
was formerly identified with Page's
department store of San Francisco
and has had a wide experience as a
manager and owner of large stores.

PROFESSOR J. H. GILBERT REPLIES TO MR. HIMES

Says Looseness Lies in Stud-
ent's Interpretation of
What He Said

Professor James H. Gilbert, of the
University, in replying to Edward
Himes' interview in Monday's Guard,
criticizing the professor's ideas on
the single tax question, has issued
the following public statement:

"If Mr. Himes' statement of my
arguments were correct then they
certainly deserve to be called 'loose-
ness.' I fear, however, that the looseness
lies in his interpretation of what I
had to say. It is not at all surpris-
ing that one utterly untrained in
economics should fail to understand
a line of discussion which was ad-
dressed to a class just completing a
year's work in the principles of
political economy. Mr. Himes' at-
tempted summary is full of mis-
statements from start to finish. He
credits me with saying, for example,
that 'all classes of property should
be taxed,' a program which no intelli-
gent student of fiscal problems
would favor and a doctrine I have
never been guilty of advocating.
Again, he says that I defined the
single tax as simply a tax upon
raw land. I am not aware that I
ever defined the single tax in any
such crude phrase. The term 'raw
land' has no meaning to the student
of economics and no place in the
economist's vocabulary. I am per-
fectly sure that I never claimed that
a man is obliged to buy land with
his labor. I did say that men are
permitted to buy land with the sav-
ings from their earnings and have
good reason to expect that these
land titles shall be respected and
perpetuated. Some of my critic's
sentences barely suggest the argu-
ments I used in class, but he credits
me with a number of statements I
fail to recognize. I object prin-
cipally to Mr. Himes' concluding
statement that I made sarcastic allu-
sions to the advocates of land value
taxation. This charge is altogether
false and misleading."

MURDEROUS FARM HAND KILLS FOUR

Pawnee City, Neb., May 29.—J. A.
McVittie, his wife and two children
were shot and killed and a third
child dangerously wounded early
today by Jim Filder, a farm hand
working for McVittie. Filder later
shot and killed himself, after shoot-
ing Sheriff Fuller three times and
seriously injuring him. McVittie
objected to Filder marrying his
daughter.

PERU AND CHILE ON VERGE OF WAR

Santiago, Chile, May 29.—In con-
sequence of serious conflicts between
Peruvians and civilians at Iquique,
Chile, yesterday, resolutions were
passed at a large meeting held here
today demanding the forcible expul-
sion of all Peruvians from the
Chilean capital. The consul of Peru
has placed the consulate here in
charge of the American consul.

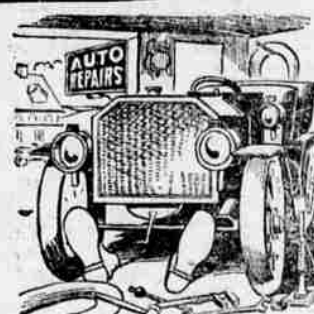

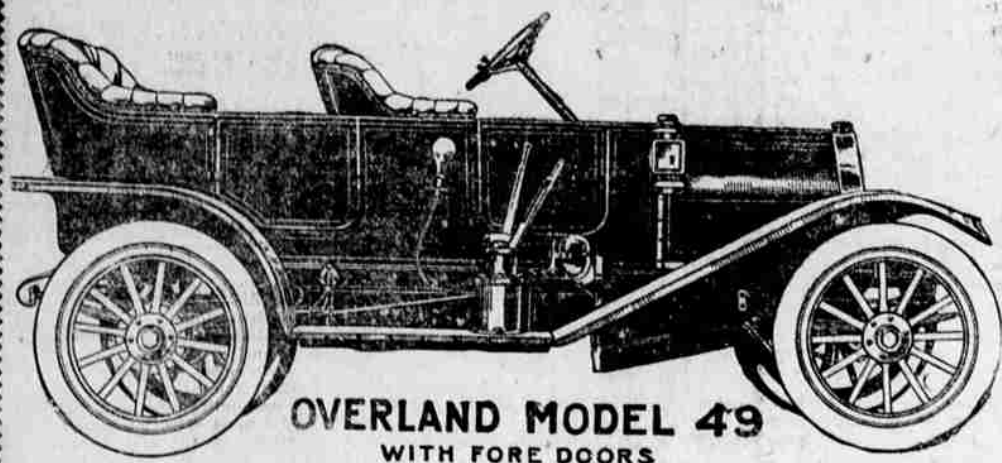
