

BIG "INDIAN" SHOOT IS ON IN FULL BLAST AT THE EUGENE GUN CLUB GROUNDS

With ideal weather conditions half a hundred Northwest "Indians" opened their annual shoot today at the Eugene hunting grounds on College Hill. Since Saturday they have been pouring into Eugene and the number of members will even exceed expectations. Many "squaws" have accompanied these white "Indians" and the visiting number in Eugene runs considerably over 100.

The Eugene grounds are ideal for trap shooting because of the elevation permitting a clear sky background, and the members of the organization are enthusiastic over the possibilities of some big scores. At yesterday's practice shoot several good scores were made, L. H. Reid, F. C. Rehl and Posten making the highest scores with 97 broken out of 100. In the amateur class Ballick made first with 97 out of 100.

Today's Shooting Fine
The shooters became more enthusiastic as the day went on. With a perfectly blue sky as a background and with a smart breeze keeping the men fresh it soon became evident that some real scores were in prospect. P. J. Holahan, of Twin Falls, Idaho, proved the best marksman this morning and opened with a run of 62. Posten, Frank Rehl and Barclay followed close with 10 lost in 45. The scores were all close and the men watched them as eagerly as a bunch of baseball fans around a newspaper scoreboard. Several of the local men opened with good records. Smith, Bean, Kay, Moulton, Kinzard, Griffin, Hill, McCormick and Dixon all having good scores.

Three traps are set on the south slope of the hill near the top. This gives an opportunity for 15 men to shoot at once. The men stayed out all day, lunches being served as they were waiting their turns to shoot. The grounds are reached by the College Hill loop car. Many ladies are in attendance. Especially among the families of the "Indians."

SPRINGFIELD MAN FINED \$500 FOR BOOZE SELLING

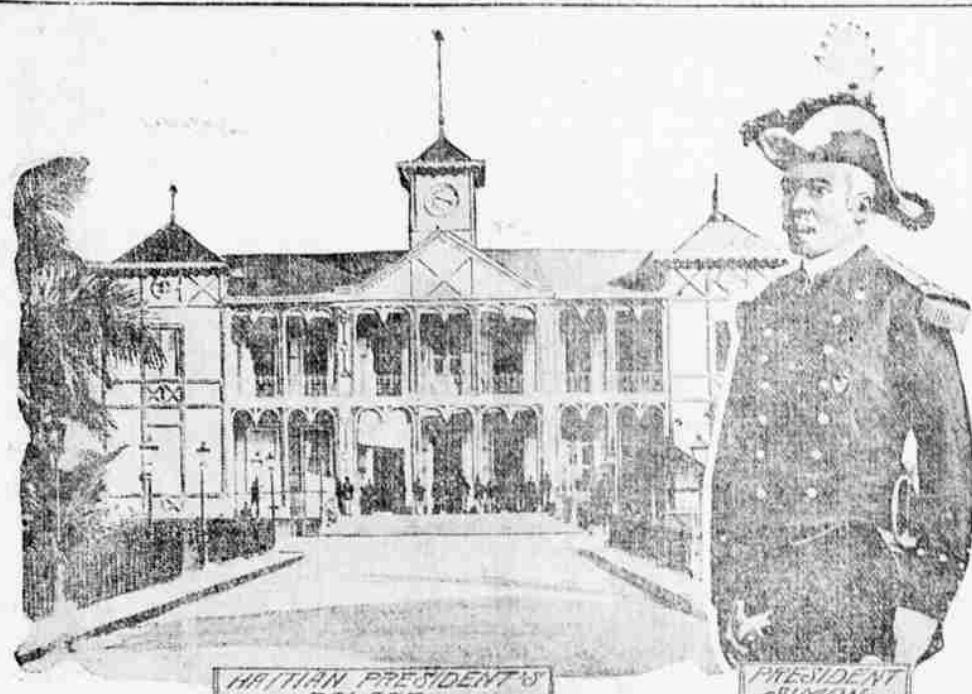
Denny Cummins, Proprietor of Hotel, Pays Penalty in Circuit Court

Denny Cummins, proprietor of the Hotel Springfield at Springfield, paid a fine of \$500 in the circuit court this morning for violating the local option law. A few days ago the grand jury returned an indictment against him and his arrest followed. He appeared in court this morning and waived time for sentence. Judge Harris imposed the fine and warned him not to repeat the offense or he would probably have to serve a term. It was alleged in the indictment that Cummins sold liquor to Cecil Rhodes on April 22, 1911.

An indictment against one who sold also at Springfield, was returned charging him with the same offense. He is in part owner of a saloon and it is alleged that he sold the liquor over the counter of his place of business.

President Simon of Haiti, Who Attained the Office Through Revolution, Now Confronted by a Revolt.



Haitian President's Palace. General Antoine Simon, who proclaimed himself president of Haiti a few years ago after having led a revolt which culminated in President Nord Alexis being deposed, now has a revolution on his own hands. The uprising is serious, and the rebels are reported to be rapidly gaining strength. There have been several sharp engagements between federal troops and rebel forces, with the latter generally victorious. The war department has invited all citizens to enlist for the defense of the country.

At 6 o'clock Friday evening a banquet will be given at the Y. M. C. A. auditorium by the ladies of the Methodist church, at which time different members of the tour party will respond to toasts that will be of interest and add to the enjoyment of the occasion.

Sunday school workers from out of the city are invited to send in their names for a seat at the banquet. On Friday evening at 8 o'clock a public mass meeting will be held in the Central Presbyterian church at which time several prominent speakers will make short addresses. W. B. MUMMEY WILL BUILD DR. BIDDLE'S NEW BLOCK ON EAST 7TH STREET

Contract Let to Him Today for \$11,130, His Bid Being the Lowest

Dr. G. W. Biddle today let the contract for the erection of his two-story reinforced concrete block on East Seventh street between Williams and Oak to W. B. Mumme, his bid being the lowest of four submitted. The bids were opened last night and after due consideration the contract was let to Mr. Mumme, who has had other large contracts in the city and has filled them very satisfactorily to all concerned.

Mr. Mumme's bid was \$11,130 for the construction of the building, the basement walls having already been built by Guy F. Pyle, Dr. Biddle's architect.

MINISTER 70 YEARS OF AGE INDICTED FOR SERIOUS OFFENSE

The grand jury last evening returned an indictment against Rev. George Burbank, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church at Coburg, on the charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. It is charged in the indictment that Burbank, on Feb. 1, 1911, entered the home of Nellie Morford, aged 14 years, at Coburg, and committed a number of disgusting acts that would characterize any man as being badly depraved. The little girl has no mother and the acts charged against the preacher are alleged to have taken place while her father was away at his work. Burbank is nearly 70 years of age and has a wife and grown daughter.

He has heretofore stood well in the ministry and has always borne a good reputation. Burbank appeared in court this afternoon at 4 o'clock and entered a plea of guilty. Sentence will be pronounced tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

LUMBER TRUST OFFICIAL DEFENDS THE COMBINE

Kansas City, Mo., June 13.—That the cost of producing yellow pine lumber increased 88 per cent from 1895 to 1906, and that supply and demand and not "price fixing" caused by yellow pine manufacturers controlled the price was the assertion of Charles S. Keith, president of the Central Coal and Coke company of this city, on the witness stand today at the hearing of the state's case against the alleged lumber trust.

BIG STRIKE TO BEGIN IN BRITAIN

Southampton, England, June 13.—The long threatened strike of the International Seamen's Union is definitely fixed to commence tomorrow. The striking coal porters today rejected their employers' proffered compromise and demanded an immediate increase in wages.

BLACKHANDS EXPLODE BOMB IN TENEMENT

New York, June 13.—Blackhands today exploded a bomb in a tenement in which ten hundred persons reside. A panic followed but no one was hurt, although the building was damaged. The refusal of Frank Zucchi longer to be made a victim of blackhand extortion brought on the outrage.

BOY KILLED BY FALLEN LIVE WIRE

Walla Walla, Wash., June 13.—While putting up some grass for his cow this morning William Warren, aged 13, picked up the end of a live wire and was killed. The wire fell during the storm of last night.

KNOX TO EXPLAIN PAYMENT TO HALE'S SON

Loose Manner of Handling Funds Unearthed by Committee

Washington, June 13.—A subpoena for Secretary of State Knox to appear and explain the payment to Frederick Hale, son of former Senator Hale, of \$5,000 from the Canadian boundary fund of the state department was issued today by the house committee on expenditures in state department. The money was said to have been paid on the sole authority of Knox's "O.K." on a piece of paper attached to an unsigned voucher.

POPULAR ELECTION OF U. S. SENATORS

Senator Borah Wins Fight For His Resolution After Hard Fight

Washington, June 13.—The senate tonight by 64 to 24 passed the Borah resolution amending the constitution to provide election of senators by direct popular vote. The Borah amendment giving to the federal government supervision of such election was adopted 45 to 44, the vice-president casting the deciding ballot. The house already has passed the resolution.

Senator Reed, of Missouri, protested against the vice-president casting his deciding vote. An amendment by Senator Bacon in qualifying the Borah amendment to prohibit federal supervision of election unless the state legislatures refused or failed to act, was defeated 4 to 43. The resolution, as amended, was then finally adopted 64 to 24.

SEVERAL KILLED IN OIL EXPLOSION

Albany, N. Y., June 13.—The fire which destroyed the building of the Albany Chemical Works this afternoon reached one of the tanks of the Texas Oil company nearby. In the explosion five or six are reported killed.

Four teachers are employed in the Beaverton schools. J. E. Wagoner of Beaverton, Idaho, has been elected principal.

The Harbison council is working on the proposal to make a city park of the strip of alfalfa between the railway and First street.

Union conventions all over the country are endorsing J. J. McNamara's arrest. The farmers of the country are planning to make respectively a campaign issue next year if Congress fails to act on the agreement at this session.

SENATE JANGLES OVER VOTE OF SHERMAN TELLS OF BENEFITS OF COMBINE IN STEEL

Bacon Raises Point That Vice President's Action Was Illegal Former Vice President Gayley, of Trust, Gives Evidence Today

Washington, June 13.—Introduction of the Canadian reciprocity bill was delayed and the senate's business program was upset today when an unexpectedly lengthy debate started on the protest of Senator Sherman, who last night broke a tie and adopted the Bristow amendment to the resolution providing for a direct election of senators. Extensive precedents were recited against and in support of the vice president's action and, however, in charge of the reciprocity measure, sought to hold the debate long enough to report the bill but had not succeeded up to a late hour.

STUDENTS LEAVE FOR HOMES DOWN RIVER IN CANOES

Numbers Will Make Entire Trip to Portland by Water Route.

A general exodus of students for their homes for summer vacation began today and will continue during the week. A number went on the early train, finishing their examinations yesterday, while others will leave tonight or tomorrow. Examinations continue until Thursday but the majority of students will finish today. An effort is being made to keep the students here for convenience, but the greater number, having been away from home for nearly nine months, are only too glad to get away.

Several students, however, will not go home in the customary manner, but will make the river trip in their canoes. This morning four students, Penningfield and Ray and the two Fowler brothers, left in respective canoes, while tomorrow Karl Marzloff and Lloyd Barzee leave. Howard Rigler, Errol Kay, Dean Walker, McCormick, Ralph Moore, Karl Onthank and several others are all planning upon this trip during the week. All will endeavor to lower the record made during spring vacation by two other students of 32 1/2 hours running time. They will come out in the same way. The weather is ideal for this trip.

FIRE IN CLOTHES CLOSET IN JAY McCORMICK'S HOUSE CAUSES LOSS

The dropping of a kerosene lamp in a clothes closet at the home of Jay J. McCormick near West Fifth and Lincoln streets shortly before 5 o'clock this afternoon did damage to the extent of \$400 or \$500 with possibly a larger water loss. The presence of mind of Mrs. McCormick who immediately shut the closet door and cut off oxygen from the flames, and the quickness of the fire department to Mrs. McCormick's telephone call saved the entire house from destruction. Mrs. McCormick went into the closet on the first floor with a lamp to find something and in doing so upset the lamp. The fire burned through to the second floor but did little other damage. A score of men took all the furniture from the house while the department quickly extinguished the flames before they gained headway. The house is owned by C. C. Warwick who lives at a point in eastern Oregon. The McCormicks lost all their clothing, except a small amount at the laundry, and that which they were wearing at the time.

PHONE COMPANIES CONSOLIDATE AT BOISE, IDAHO

The Idaho Statesman, published at Boise, Idaho, in its editorial column, under date of May 22nd, 1911, has the following to say with reference to the consolidation of the two telephone companies of Boise (Idaho): "The nuisance of a double telephone system in Boise, will have been abated when the merger of the local business of the Bell and the Independent Companies shall have been completed. It is the sensible thing to do. While such a company has given a good service a better service is desired by the telephone people and by their patrons, and it is possible only under some such reorganization as that outlined in Sunday's paper. It will also be possible for the stockholders to realize something out of their investment from the local telephone field. The telephone business is a natural monopoly and it is only as such that it can succeed and give a satisfactory service to the public. The only advantage a telephone enjoys from being a monopoly is in having an undisturbed field wherein to garner reasonable profits—for none other are possible. Telephones are rented only when the service is satisfactory, and the charge fair. One strong organization in a community like this can make a fair profit and furnish a splendid service. With two there is no profit for either, the service is not what it should be, and the public is annoyed by the double system. No one wants the kitchen cluttered up with two ranges. Then, why two phones?"

NEWS OF LOWER SIUSLAW COUNTRY

Tuesday morning the steamer Rescue towed a raft of old logs and rubbish down to the mouth of the river, where it was turned loose and allowed to drift out to sea. While out hunting for snipe on Benedict's marsh near Acme about a week ago, Wm. Fisk ran on to a flock of about thirty wild geese and succeeded in bagging about five of them. It is unusual for geese to be found here as late in the spring as this.

The people of Acme are arranging to hold a grand celebration at that place on the Fourth of July. A meeting was held there Monday evening at which committees were appointed and steps taken to arrange for a fitting observance of the day. The plan is to hold an old fashioned picnic, with a program of addresses and music. A series of athletic contests will be held for those who enjoy sports of this kind.
