AMEND CHARTER TO IMPROVE THE AMAZON

City Attorney Will Prepare an Amendment to be Voted Upon by People

At the city council meeting last night Acting City Attorney Skelton gave it as his opinion that in order to improve the Amazon through in the southern part of the city it is necessary to amend the city charter and he was given instructions to prepare an amendment to be voted upon.

The paving matter came up again, but no action was taken. Councilman Wetherbee, who made the recent trip to Medford with the mayor and other councilmen, told of the work he had done there and urged action in Eugene. There was some discussion but a lack of action to be regretted by all.

The street committee reported that Dr. Hiddle refused to pay the assessment against him for paving the alley along his property because the work was poorly done.

Treasurer's Report

The report of City Treasurer Renshaw showed the following balances on hand June 12th:

General fund	\$2256.00
Improvement sinking fund	\$24.51
Refunding fund	\$81.99
Sewer fund	\$767.00
City street extension fund	\$9.00
City fund	\$371.00
Roads and streets	\$157.00

A motion to pay \$7500 interest on July 1 on the \$300,000 water works bonds was carried. The treasurer was also directed to take up \$5,000 of sewer bonds, payable July 15th, and to pay \$350 interest due on other sewer bonds outstanding.

The treasurer was granted a leave of absence from July 20 to September 1.

The city engineer was directed to buy 2000 survey stakes and to store them in the city hall.

Remove Old Tabernacle

A petition to remove the old tabernacle at the corner of West Tenth and Charleston street was presented. Attached to the petition was a statement by V. McFarland, former city building inspector, that it was agreed that the building be torn down after it had been used for the Oliver revival meetings.

A notice was read from the county fruit inspector ordering a number of trees in the streets destroyed as they are infected with the San Jose scale.

Plank Gets No Money

The city attorney submitted a report that the city is not bound to pay the back salary of E. T. Plank, who served as night policeman under the Matlock regime. There was a motion to pay the salary but it was lost.

Plank and Kouppe voting aye and Lay, Wetherbee, Bell, Ness and Stricker voting no.

The city attorney reported that the proposed amendment to the charter giving the water board authority to sell electricity is unnecessary, as the session laws of 1911 give cities and corporations this right.

The city engineer was directed to give the correct lines for walks on the south side of Tenth street from Charleston to Lawrence.

Mayor E. J. Bergen presented his resignation as a member of the library board. It was accepted and Allen Esten was appointed and confirmed.

The Lane County Agricultural society asked a piece of the grounds belonging to the city but used at the fair grounds last year. Referred to the fire and water committee.

The usual permission was given the Fourth of July committee to sell concessions for the celebration with the understanding that conflict shall not be sold.

Viewers' Report Rejected

M. Svarverud, one of the viewers for opening of Olive street from Fifth street to the Southern Pacific right-of-way, appeared before the council to explain that the first report was the best they could make under the circumstances; that they did not think any other assessment than on adjacent property owners could stand. The report of the viewers, which had been filed several weeks ago, was rejected.

An ordinance was passed assessing the cost of a sewer in the alley between Third and Fourth street from Jackson to Blair street.

The re-plat of a block in Fairmount by George McLean was approved by the council.
