Will It Help Eugene Grow?

A city administration with its hands full waging destructive competition against a public utility company will find little time for carrying out reform measures in city government.

It will find little opportunity to devote itself to CREATIVE plans for the up-building of the city.

Effort which should be spent in working out improvements which will add to the convenience, comfort and attractiveness of Eugene, will be devoted to trying to drive the Oregon Power Company out of business.

The questions of retrenchment in city expenditures, efficient results for the money spent and KEEPING DOWN THE TAXES as low as progress warrants, will be forgotten in a fanatical attempt to crush a legitimate liberally managed business out of existence.

It can be a question of time only before the majority of citizens see the folly and the wrong of this procedure and will FORCE A CHANGE.

In the meantime additional BOND-ED INDEBTEDNESS of at least \$125,000.00 will be incurred to DUPLICATE PROPERTY ALREADY CONSTRUCTED.

In the meantime the municipal power plant will incur large deficits which MUST be paid for in TAXES.

And while the expensive pastime of "competition" is indulged in, the small taxpayer and the small electric light customer will be helping to pay the POWER BILLS of the manufacturer and the lighting bills of the BIG CONSUMER.

Under such conditions there is small likelihood of the municipal waterworks receiving proper attention, or a REDUCTION OF WATER

RATES.

Would it not be well for the city to prove its capacity as a successful operator of the waterworks, and its ability to reduce water rates, before it tackles the hazards of competition in the electric lighting and power business?

Water, everyone concedes, should be one of the first considerations of every group of people banded together in a community. Everyone who contemplates residence in Eugene is deeply interested in the character of the supply and the RATES CHARGED.

It is a well known fact that water rates HAVE NOT BEEN REDUCED since the municipality acquired the property, and that they have been INCREASED in some cases.

Up to this time, is the municipal administration of the water works a certificate of recommendation for municipal management of a competing electric utility?

The questions raised in this article are all serious ones and worthy of earnest consideration by every citizen who wants to see Eugene grow and to make it a better place to live and earn one's living in.

The Oregon Power Company has a vital interest in the progress of the city—an interest which is not dependent upon competition from the municipality or any other source.

We desire to help, not to hold back. Our best efforts have been given along this line. The investment of hundreds of thousands of dollars during the past year, prove the substantial nature of this interest.

Competition in the electric business will not be to the best interests of Eugene, or its citizens, from any point of view.

Restaurant fixtures belonging to R. R. Bly, who recently purchased the Louvre restaurant from Ed Hosmer, have arrived at the freight depot and will be installed in the restaurant here.

The Presbyterian Sunday school held a picnic in the grove at West Springfield today. Quite a number of the children and their teachers went on the cars and staid till late in the afternoon.

Karl Mills yesterday received a card from W. T. Gordon, who, with Mrs. Gordon, is taking a trip through the east. The card was written at Erie, Pa., on June 9, and they were headed west at that time.

The Mohawk Lumber company will soon establish a lumber yard in Eugene, having leased ground adjoining the mill race on East Sixth street from F. L. Chambers. Work on the necessary buildings has begun.

R. Rae, who has conducted a florist's shop on East Ninth street, has purchased the business of Ruggles Bros., who conduct a similar place further toward Willamette street on the same street and will consolidate the two.

In the list of stage passengers out this morning, as given in last night's Guard, was Joe Morris and wife to Mapleton. This was a mistake. Instead of his wife, it was his daughter, Sylvia. Mrs. Morris remained at home this trip.

The majority of the fraternity and sorority houses at the University will remain open during summer school, because a large number of students expect to remain. This will give the city a semi-college atmosphere for the next six weeks. It is expected that summer school this year will have a larger enrollment than ever before.

A street lighting system has been planned for the town of Halsey. It will consist of five arc lamps and seven or eight incandescents. The city council of that place granted the Oregon Power company a franchise for the distribution of light and power on Monday night. The electricity will be taken from the Springfield-Albany transmission line.

The Oregon Power company is using a novel method of pulling down the wire from the old transmission line between Eugene and Springfield that was replaced by new and heavier wire. A drum and electric motor and a transformer are put on a wagon and the motor supplied with electricity taken directly from the transmission line. This furnishes power to wind the drum that hauls in the old wire. Superintendent Frank Burke is responsible for the labor saving plan.

Included in the party is Mr. Gray, the new manager of the Oregon Electric, and his special attention will be called to the necessity of extending his line to Eugene from Salem at once.

Work is now progressing on the Eugene-Suslaw line, the Oregon Electric is preparing to build from Salem, and the Portland, Eugene & Electric is soon to begin grading to Monroe near Corvallis.

Eugene is sure to expand in a westerly direction and a year from now Blair street addition will be inside property.
