DR. YOUNG SPEAKS TO STUDENTS OF UNIVERSITY

Baccalaureate Services Attended by 1500 People
—Many Turned Away

Fifteen hundred people including 75 gowned and capped members of University of Oregon graduating class attended 35th annual baccalaureate services in Villard hall yesterday and heard a practical and unusually fine sermon by Rev. Benjamin Young, of the Taylor street Methodist church of Portland. It was a remarkable sermon, dealing with practical problems that will confront the outgoing class.

Over 500 people were unable to obtain admittance and the University's wonderful lack of an assembly hall was made apparent. In turn, Rev. Mr. Young confessed that he had never spoken to such an appreciative audience, and one that seemed to throw so with each of his sentiments.

"Character and a crisis make history." This was the opening sentence and theme and he showed how that in this practical and active age it is the problem, not of tomorrow or yesterday, but of today that must be met by the student and thinker. "We live in an active age and in a complex civilization. The world is in a desperate hurry. Men have never seen such strides of progress. Shall we cry out against this? Shall we array ourselves in hostility to the onward spirit? We could as well oppose the laws of gravitation. It would be far better to study the law that is back of the onward movement and understand that which is manifested."

"The power of one's assimilation will be the measure of his success. Your ability to apply and to make practical acquired wisdom will determine the quality of your contribution to history. The dreamer may have his place, but the directors of modern civilization will be the men who have the ability to convert static wisdom into dynamic power. The stress to be placed upon knowledge is not its acquisition but its application."

Then granting that the graduating class had acquired knowledge and understood its application the speaker enumerated and dwelt upon the following six instructions: "First, one must be master of his own intellectual machinery, and think for himself. There is such a thing as not knowing what to do with one's head. One must have an absolute control of his intellectual machinery as the operator of the mechanical machine. Let it not run wild—we have enough of that in fact some in Oregon. The value of an education is in the ability to think, to answer questions, and to solve problems that need solution." Dr. Young characterized the modern novel as "ephemeral literature" and "debris floating in dishevelment." His second point was the necessity of an inflexible adherence to truth.

"Truth stirs men and sometimes makes them uncomfortable. But the truth will make you free. It sometimes may mean ostracism, ridicule, scorn or contempt. Experience is man's wisdom; doing right is God's. But the only way to reach the highest is through the high. The way

to progress is through righteousness and through moral ideals. "Thirdly, one must have self-mastery. Self confidence is a requisite for the struggle, and self mastery is needed when the storm of passion arises, and when one must keep back the first word that might bring disaster upon himself. Our feelings and desires feed upon their own expression. First comes fear, then weakness and finally submission. Consideration of evil will destroy the balance of the soul."

The fourth point dealt with the struggle for the upward tendency. "It is not difficult to believe in progress for it is everywhere evident. Throughout the evolution of the world it has been life at the cost of life, and progress at the cost of sacrifice. There is no achievement without effort."

"Fifthly, personality is the keynote of progress. Man is the end of progress. Both science and the Bible have placed him in the last stage of evolution. A feature of the commencement services is the music under the direction of Professor Glen, of the University school of music. Miss Virginia Spencer-Hutchinson, of Portland, was the soloist, rendering "Lead Kindly Light." A 22-piece orchestra headed by Carl Denton, the Portland concert master, and composed of some of the finest talent of the state, furnished what is said to be the best commencement music ever heard in Villard hall. The songs of Miss Lola Prosser, of Eugene, and William L. L. the Chinese student was unusually fine, and a chorus of 50 voices perfectly trained captivated.
