Salem, Or., June 21.—That it is a violation of the law to paint signs on automobiles is the interpretation placed upon the law by Secretary of State Olcott. Only two numbers are allowed, and one must be in front and one in rear. To paint other numbers would therefore be illegal. Practically every auto owner in applying for numbers wants his old number or some particular number. This is a request which can be granted to no one, as it would completely confuse and disarrange the records in the office.

The lad quickly rode to the nearest farm house and telephoned to the city for his parents, who in company with a physician, went out in an auto and brought him to town.
