How the Peak Load Affects Our Investment

Continuing the effort to explain why the electric business is different in many fundamental principles from the ordinary commercial enterprises, we wish to bring out several points of particular interest.

Electricity is what is known as an **INSTANTANEOUS PRODUCT**.

It cannot be stored economically in large quantities. **IT MUST BE PRODUCED AS IT IS USED.**

These facts make it necessary to provide sufficient producing and distributing apparatus to meet **THE GREATEST DEMAND OF ALL CUSTOMERS AT ANY ONE TIME.**

Where a factory may turn out wares in slack periods and sell the goods when the market becomes active, or may thus equalize the strains against rush seasons, an electric plant cannot so arrange its affairs.

THERE IS NO SUCH THING AS AVERAGING THE WORK OF AN ELECTRIC PLANT.

The capacity of the plant—including distributing system—must be large enough to meet the greatest simultaneous demand of all customers, plus a safe margin of reserve to guard against accidents and other emergencies.

The size of the **CAPACITY** fixes the amount of investment. The amount of investment is determined, **NOT** by the average work which the plant is to do, but by the greatest quantity of work it has to do at any one time.

The greatest quantity of work

which an electric plant has to do at any one time is called the "peak of the load." It can be understood easily how and why it is the **CONTROLLING ELEMENT IN THE COST OF THE PROPERTY.**

The maximum demand of the shortest and darkest winter day fixes the capacity and investment of an electric plant.

Fixed charges—interest, depreciation, taxes, insurance, maintenance, etc.—are in proportion to the **TOTAL CAPACITY**, a large part of which capacity is permitted to work no more than **A FEW WEEKS EACH YEAR.**

The boilers, engines, dynamos, and distributing system necessary to meet the peak load demands must, in part, stand idle during the majority of the hours of the day and the majority of the days of the year.

It should not be difficult to appreciate these vital points of variation between mercantile establishments, factories and other classes of commercial undertakings, contrasted with the business of producing and supplying electricity for light and power.

The problem of making the capacity, and thereby the investment, of an electric plant work more hours per day was and still is one of the most serious questions confronting the electrical industry. It constitutes the lever which has produced the widespread use of electricity for power and heating applications.

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ENGLAND ADMITS PERUVIAN ATROCITIES

Would Apologize to Americans Who Made Exposures in Rubber Country

London, June 27.—Practically declaring true reports of horrible atrocities perpetrated in the rubber country of Peru, Ecuador and Colombia, the British government has asked the Peruvian legation in London to apologize to Truitt, a weekly newspaper, and to W. E. Hardenburg, an American railroad engineer, for having accused them of participation in a scheme to blackmail the Peruvian Amazon company, with headquarters in London.

Truth had printed statements by Hardenburg in which he described conditions existing in the company's rubber territory as worse than those found in the Congo. The foreign office has told the Peruvian legation that unless it does apologize relations between it and the British government will not be friendly. The truth of Hardenburg's charges was proven by Consul-General Casement, the British representative in Brazil, who penetrated in to the country known to rubber collectors as "the devil's paradise." Casement found that the rubber collectors had committed the most horrible crimes. He asserted:

"That they reduced the natives to a condition worse than normal slavery; that they made them work without pay; that they stole their crops; that they stole their women and children to satisfy their own passions and avarice; that they sold the natives into slavery, wholesale and retail; that they flogged men and women until their bones were laid bare; that the victims were left without medical attention, eaten by maggots until they died, when their bodies were thrown to the dogs; that they mutilated by cutting off ears, fingers, arms and legs; that they tortured by water, fire and crucifixion with the head downward; that they chopped their victims to pieces with machetes and that they sewed their victims in Kerosene, and lighted them to form living torches."

According to the latest advice, the Peruvian government has promised to do all in its power to put an end to the barbarities in the "British-owned Congo." Soldiers have been sent to the camps, only to find the worst offenders among the rubber collectors had fled.

The attitude of the foreign office here suggests that it intends to keep the Peruvian government to its task.

BRINGS MORE SUITS

The Oregon Electric company began condemnation proceedings today against Edward Sauter and Mattie J. Sauter and also filed a similar suit against the Chas. K. Spaulding Lumber company. In both cases it is alleged that the property owned by the defendants is needed by the company in the construction of its line from Portland to Albany, and that, as the parties will not accept the price offered by the company it is necessary for the court to fix a price.

Counting the two above cases, eight condemnation suits in all have been filed by the company against those who have refused to sell their property to the company. The suits are against Jacob Schindler, John Hughes Co., Ella Houston, John W. Fromader, Jennette and Georgia Both and D. C. Minto.—Salem Journal.

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
