GUARD'S ALASKAN TRIP WILL BE ENTERTAINING

Alaska Steamship Co. Promises the Winners a Very Enjoyable Time

In all the western world there is no trip like the tour to Southeastern Alaska, via the Alaska Steamship company, from Puget Sound ports. When one considers that travelers who have crossed the Atlantic spend thousands of dollars and put up with countless inconveniences, poor hotels and lack of transportation facilities, to see the Alps, the Mediterranean or the Rhine it will come possibly as a surprise when it is said that a glorie trailer recently made the statement that the Southeastern Alaska tour eclipsed any in the world.

They are never out of sight of land and with the possible exception of an hour or two crossing the open sea, one never is called upon to comb seaweeds, as the summer trip is a vacation trip with the added interest of the stiff salt breeze from the grand Pacific and the wonderful scenery enroute.

This tour takes from nine to eleven days from Seattle and if need be one can remain on the ship continuously from the time of departure until the hour of return. There are stops of from three to five hours at all of the important places where passengers can walk ashore, purchasing souvenirs, visit the Indian villages, the old Russian settlements, totem poles and view the remarkable fish-catch at Ketchikan. This, happening every day, creates just enough exercise and change from the ocean

voyage to add largely to the general pleasure of the trip. A traveler should be dressed warmly for the journey with substantial medium wraps to ward off the effects of cooling night breezes on deck. It never grows cold, nor does it ever become uncomfortably warm, but it is necessary to meet the conditions of the evening ocean breeze by being dressed warmly enough to be comfortable.

And by all means take a kodak. The steamships JEFFERSON and DOLPHIN, which are used exclusively in this service and on which our prize winners will make the tour, are both very popular boats. Having just been completely overhauled, redecorated and repaired, both steamers are in perfect condition for the summer campaign. A special effort will be made to have the dining room and state-room service on the DOLPHIN and JEFFERSON especially good, and those who take this trip will be assured of every courtesy and attention.
