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BONDS SHOULD BE VOTED.

The two bond propositions to be submitted at a special election July 17, should carry.

One proposition is to take up \$130,000 worth of outstanding city warrants, drawing 6 per cent interest, and issue in their place the same amount of 25 year bonds, drawing not more than 5 per cent interest. This is merely a good business proposition and does not increase the city's indebtedness, merely changing its form. When the last refunding bond election was held money was tight and bond buyers scarce, and it was thought best not to attempt to issue bonds to cover the entire warrant indebtedness. Now, however, financial conditions are different and it is regarded as an excellent time to refund the full floating indebtedness that is not likely to be called in by immediate tax payments.

A second proposition is submitted on recommendation of the city water board. Bonds to the amount of \$57,000 are asked for the proceeds to be used in perfecting the light, water and power system owned by the city. These, too, should carry, since the water board, composed of Messrs. E. U. Lee, M. Svarverud, C. S. Frank, B. B. McKinney and R. M. Day, who are capable business men, feel that they need this amount to carry out their plans to make these plants a source of income to the people. It would not be wise to hamper such men in the discharge of their duty to the public, but to give them all reasonable financial assistance and co-operation. The sums asked for seems to be very modest, but the members of the board, who have carefully gone over these matters, are satisfied that it will cover all their needs fully and give the people of Eugene a complete light, power and water plant.
