GIRL BURNED TO DEATH IN AUTO EXPLOSION

Her Sister, Father and Two Brothers Badly Burned at Same Time

Grants Pass, Or., July 6.—When the gasoline tank on the rear end of their automobile bumped loose on a projecting rock in the middle of the Crescent City stage road late last night, the resulting explosion burned 14-year-old Myrna Kelly, daughter of John B. Kelly, of 345 Haight street, San Francisco, so terribly that she died at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon; scorched another daughter, Angela, a student at the University of California, until in her agony she leaped from her seat and was crushed under the car, which had got beyond control, and seared and blistered the faces and bodies of Kelly and his little sons, Hobart and Homer, 8 and 6 years old.

Members of the stricken family were brought to the Grants Pass Hospital this afternoon. From the first there was no hope for the life of little Myrna, whose clothes had been burned almost entirely off her body. Enduring frightful suffering, she had passed nearly the whole night with only the rude attentions that occupants of farmhouses near the scene of the accident could give her.

Angela, the other daughter, is injured internally and has several ribs broken. In addition to severe burns if she recovers, which is doubtful, she will be scarred and perhaps crippled for life. The other three, Kelly and his two sons, whose faces swollen beyond recognition, and blistered hands, give mute evidence of the appalling suddenness of the accident and the manner in which the occupants of the car were trapped in seats, with not a chance to escape. Will probably get well, though they will always bear the scars. The condition of the little boy is the most serious.
