

GUARD'S CONTEST CLOSES TONIGHT AT 11 P. M.

VOTES WILL NOT BE COUNTED UNTIL TUESDAY, JULY 11
AT 10 A. M. THIS IS DONE TO ALLOW FOR COMPLETE
RETURNS FROM OUTSIDE DISTRICTS.

Final Count Will Be In Guard Office

We Want Everyone of the Contestants to be Present—10 a. m.
Tuesday, July 11th.

Tonight at 11 p. m. the Guard's Great Alaskan Trip Contest closes. It has been a very friendly contest and while the girls in the same district and while trying hard to surpass each other in the amount of subscriptions turned in, there has never been a bit of ill-feeling between the contestants.

Auto Puffs and Snorts

Guard Special Service.
The final date for the French Grand Prix has been fixed—July 23. Washington has rebelled against the musical sirens. Hereafter it will be the plain every day honk, honk, for a signal.

The police department of Indianapolis has replaced all horses in the service except those ridden by the mounted police squad. It has just added a third gasoline patrol wagon to its equipment.

Hawaii is an ideal touring country. Many of its roads being paved for miles with a composition of lava harder than granite and affording a perfect service for the automobile. The tropical scenery is most beautiful. It is possible to drive an auto to the edge of the nine-mile crater of Kilauea, the largest active volcano in the world, 6,000 feet above sea level.

Thirty-eight state bodies are now included in the membership of the American Automobile Association, South Carolina being the most important addition made at the annual session of the board of managers last month at national headquarters, 437 Fifth avenue, New York. Pennsylvania sent notification of an increase of five clubs, Michigan two and New York three, while other states report single gains.

Horsepower is called nominal, indicated or actual. Nominal is used by manufacturers of steam engines to express the capacity of the cylinder in operation without deduction for friction, and actual marks its power as developed in operation without deducting for the friction of the engine's operation. The original estimate of Watt of raising 33,000 foot pounds per minute is still taken as standard.

One more ill has been laid to the door of the motor vehicle. Cancer is on the increase, and one reason for this undesirable condition of affairs is ascribed to the automobile, which helps to raise the cancer death rate. It is true that it has co-operatives, the abnormal use of alcoholic liquors and the consumption of meat without outdoor exercise to offset its evil effects, "but it is the day of overeating and automobile rides," says one distinguished New York physician, "that is making cancer increase so rapidly."

Some of the big farmers of Kansas have been opposing the good roads movement and as they are men of influence in the state, one of the officials set about to find out their objection to such an important improvement. One sold his farm because his neighbor built a rock road in front of it, because it would force him to have his horses shod. Another said he would favor good roads only if a law were passed prohibiting motor cars from using them. Another protests that hard roads not only compel him to have his horses shod, but wear out his wagons and farm machinery.
