

How Will the Bond Money Be Spent?

Citizens are now asked by the Eugene Water Board to mortgage their property again to the extent of \$57,000.

Of this amount at least \$32,000 is wanted for the Municipal Power Plant, in which the majority of thinking citizens have lost all confidence.

How much of the remaining \$25,000 is to be sunk in the power plant, the Water Board does not explain.

THE WATER BOARD DOES NOT EVEN PROMISE EXTENSIONS OF WATER MAINS TO VARIOUS PARTS OF THE CITY DEMANDING WATER SERVICE.

Read over the recent statement to citizens asking them to vote the bonds and see if you can find any such assurance or promise.

In order to get votes for the power plant bonds the Board has connected up the question of water works improvement and main extensions.

This is designed to gain the support of people who lack water service, and who need it badly—in Fairmount, the western, northwestern, and other parts of the City.

It would have been an easy and simple matter to submit separate bond issues—one for water works improvement, and one for the city power plant. Then citizens would have a clear expression of the intentions of the Board. **IF A MAN WANTED WATER WORKS EXTENSIONS HE COULD VOTE FOR THEM WITHOUT VOTING TO WASTE MORE MONEY ON A POWER PLANT WHICH CAN NEVER PAY EXPENSES.**

What is there to prevent the entire \$57,000 bond issue—to be submitted at the election next Monday—from being diverted to the power plant?

It will require far more than \$32,000.00 to complete the power plant and place it on an "earning basis." Upwards of \$100,000 is absolutely necessary to put the plant in shape to offer commercial service.

WHY DOES NOT THE WATER BOARD TAKE THE PEOPLE INTO ITS CONFIDENCE AND GIVE THEM AT LEAST AN OUTLINE OF ITS PLANS AND ESTIMATES?

What parts of the City are to be served by the new water mains (if any are proposed),—what is the size of the pipes—how much will the new pump cost—how much electrical distributing system will be built—what parts of the city will be reached?—All these questions the taxpayers have a right to ask.

What is more important, the taxpayers have the right to expect satisfactory answers before they continue blindly furnishing money upon the recommendation of a few men, appointed to serve them in a special capacity.

ATTEMPTS TO TRAP CITIZENS INTO VOTING MORE CASH FOR THE POWER PLANT BY COUPLING THAT ISSUE WITH WATER MAINS, WILL BE RESENTED.

The \$57,000.00 bond issue should be **VOTED DOWN** and the City Council requested to submit **A NEW BOND ISSUE FOR WATER WORKS IMPROVEMENT ALONE**, at the earliest possible date. Then there will be a fair opportunity of getting the water main extensions which the City should have.

FIGHT THANKSGIVING

Los Angeles, July 10.—Ad Wolgast, lightweight champion of the world, and Freddie Welsh, challenger, will meet in a 20-round fight for the title here on Thanksgiving day, November 30. This was virtually decided upon when Wolgast and Welsh met after their unsatisfactory conferences last night.

The terms accepted by the fighters from Promoter McCarey call for an unpublished amount for Wolgast, said to be \$15,000 and \$5,000 for Welsh. In addition, Wolgast will get 51 per cent of the receipts from the movie pictures and Welsh 49 per cent. There will be no side bet.

Woodburn succeeded in defeating Salem Sunday by the score of 5 to 4. In its game with Corvallis Albany was successful in winning by a record of 8 to 0.

ACCOUNT 56 YEARS OLD WILL BE PAID

Congress Takes up Bill for Bacon and Oats Supplied to Indian Fighters

Cottage Grove, Or., July 11.—During the Rogue River Indian war in 1856-57 John H. Shortridge, then living six miles south of Cottage Grove, sold to Captain Jonathan Kennedy, who was marching to the scene of the outbreak with a company of volunteers from near Salem, 350 lbs. of bacon and 50 bushels of oats, for which he never received payment from the government, although an invoice for these supplies was submitted at the time.

At the time Portland was the only market for this section and Shortridge had loaded into a wagon a large amount of bacon, ready to go to Portland, when Captain Kennedy proposed to take a sufficient quantity of it to supply his command, and the deal was made. Bacon was worth 25 cents a pound, the transaction amounting to \$87.50, while the oats, at 20 cents a bushel, made the aggregate sum due from the government \$97.50.

It is this amount, with interest for 54 years, that Mr. Shortridge is now endeavoring to collect through Congressman Hawley, who has written the creditor that the account will be satisfactorily adjusted during the present session of congress, notwithstanding the fact that there is found no record of the purchase. W. S. Brock, whose home was at Eugene, was the only witness to the transaction, and he has long since passed away.

When Captain Kennedy arrived at this place a number of horses they rode were sorely in need of a smithy's attention, and Mr. Shortridge worked long into the night, putting the animals into condition to continue the journey over the rough mountain trail to the south, for which service he made no charge nor received no compensation, while Mrs. Shortridge busied herself in making the soldiers' temporary stay comfortable.

Mr. and Mrs. Shortridge long ago gave up the farm and are spending their remaining days in this city.
