Notice is hereby given that by Ordinance No. 1118 duly passed, the Common Council of the City of Eugene has called a Special City Election to be held in the City of Eugene, Oregon, on the 17th day of July, 1911, between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 7 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of submitting to the voters of said city two certain proposed Charter Amendments.

1st. Proposing the addition to the City Charter of Section 139, authorizing the Common Council to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City of Eugene to the amount of \$150,000 for the purpose of refunding the general indebtedness of the city.

2nd. Proposing the addition to the City Charter of Section 140, authorizing the Common Council to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City of Eugene to the amount of \$57,000 for the purpose of adding to the lighting system, for the betterment of the power plant for laying mains, from pumping station to reservoirs, and for extension and general improvement of water mains and for the purpose of buying additional pumps for the City of Eugene.

WOMAN AND BABIES BURNED TO DEATH

Coroner at Raymond Believes the Fire Killing Whole Family Accidental

Raymond, Wash., July 11.—All doubt as to the fate of Mrs. James Skochne, of Smith Creek, who was supposed to have been burned to death, together with her three children, in a fire which destroyed their home Saturday night, has been settled, with the finding of her charred remains in the ruins of her home. There is no doubt but what the bones found are those of the woman, as they are too large for those of either of her children. All that was found of the three little ones was a heap of ashes and little blackened bones.

Mrs. Skochne was separated from her husband and is said to have shown signs of mental derangement. Bark-peeler, who stopped at the farm last week reported they found the children tied to bedposts and the mother, at a neighbors. Piles of dried moss and kindling were about the dwelling. The woman, who was unable to speak English, could not make the party understand her reason for this.

As near as Coroner Gruwell could ascertain the fire was of unknown origin, and not fired by Mrs. Skochne, while temporarily deranged. The body of the woman was found on the floor and it appeared as though she had been awakened by the fire and was endeavoring to rescue her children from another bed when overcome by the smoke and all perished.

TACOMA OBSERVES FIRST "UMPIRE DAY"

Official Showered With Roses and Praise Instead of Abuse

Tacoma, Wash., July 12.—For the first time in the history of baseball, an umpire day has been celebrated. Sunday afternoon 5000 persons turned out to the ball park to fetter Umpire Jake Baumgarten and show him that baseball can be played under conditions where the umpire is not even questioned. Baumgarten was showered with roses and a score or more mammoth bouquets were presented to him.

Throughout the contest between Tacoma and Vancouver, nothing but words of commendation and praise were heard about the umpire. At the close of the game, Baumgarten took his station at the grandstand gate and presented roses to the women who had attended the game.

At the beginning of the contest, Baumgarten was introduced by Lorenzo Dow, state representative, who declared that the day had been set aside in honor of the umpire—his profession, not the individual. He said that Baumgarten representing the men of his calling, was thrice welcome. Then came the presentation of flowers amid cheers of approval.

During the game, players, when asked about rulings, removed their caps and used "sir" and "mister" in addressing the official in charge of the game. Baumgarten said afterward that it seemed too good to be true and that he would wake up tomorrow in Spokane, in about the third inning and find out that an umpire was still an undesirable citizen. Sunday games in Tacoma have frequently been tempestuous for the "umps."

The movement for umpire day was the idea of G. W. Bishop, sporting editor of the Tacoma News. It was started first in jest, but was taken up by a committee of baseball fans and carried through to a complete and unqualified success. Fans declare that umpire day will be an annual feature upon the local grounds in the future.

JOE CHOYNSKI IS IN PORTLAND

Former Lightweight Pugilist Says Wolgast is a Great Fighter

Joe Choynski, who used to swap punches with the lightweights in these parts in 1903, and who can now make 207 pounds at 3 o'clock most any afternoon, blew into Portland yesterday for a brief stay, in the interest of the Richard K. Fox sporting publications, of which he is the only western representative. Jack was inquiring for his old friends of the padded mitt days, such as Myer's Billy Smith, Dud Evans, Paddy Maher, Jack and Peter Grant, Jack O'Day and others.

Choynski used to be a pupil of Jack Dempsey, and in his prime was regarded as one of the best tria horses in the country. He had a number of hard fights in the old days when the real ring game flourished in Portland.

Choynski has a splendid word for Wolgast, who he says is one of the greatest little strategists the game has boasted of in late years. Referring to the memorable fight at Point Richmond, when Wolgast's fists slashed great gobs of gloom over one battling Nelson, he said that the Battler was beaten at his own game of roughing it.

But Was Gentle
In fact, he asserted that Nelson fought a parlor fight compared to the back-room tactics of Wolgast, and he opines that Bat was afraid to start any rough stuff with Adolph.

Wolgast even "outkicked" the Dane, who tried to get his "rong" as the fighters entered the ring. When Abdul the Turk, carried Nelson into the ring, Wolgast turned around for the first time at the top of his voice. "Look at him! That's the way they'll be carrying him out!" And they did.

Wolgast so maneuvered his battle that at the end of each round he was in front of his own seat, and ready to drop into it, while Nelson had to walk clear across the ring.

Choynski thinks there will be nothing to it but Wolgast in the fight with Welsh.—Journal.

OREGON NEEDS NEW GAME REGULATIONS

Medford, Or., July 12.—"We must revise our fish and game laws, stock our streams and forests with fish and game and make Oregon the mecca of the world for sportsmen," declared William Finley, state game warden, in an address at the opera-house here last night. "Salmon brings in between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000 to this state now, and we can double this by stocking our streams."

"Many of our laws are antiquated. A rancher should be allowed to kill a bird that does harm to his locality. Certain birds should be imported into certain localities. Bob Whites can be secured from Oklahoma and would be inestimable good. Certain kinds of birds are absolutely necessary in certain districts to destroy pests."

The men who were here were: Mr. Finley, Ed. Clanton, master fish warden, J. N. Wisner, superintendent of hatcheries, and the members of the state fish and game commission. They were given a banquet.
