MORTIMER DAVIES

MEETS UNTIMELY DEATH WHILE IN BATHING

Got in Water too Deep for Him
at Springfield Yesterday
Afternoon

Guard Special Service:

Springfield, July 13.—Mortimer
Davies, a 17-year-old boy of this city
was drowned late yesterday after-
noon in the Willamette river while
swimming. He was in the water
with a group of his boy friends and
stepped in water over his head, and
unable to swim sufficiently to over-
come the strong current at that place
was drowned as his playmates
sought to save him. Max Green,
succeeded in reaching the drowning
boy but was not strong enough to
rescue him and saw him sink with
the words, "Help me, Max." The
boy's father, J. M. Davies, who is a
teamster hauling gravel from the
bar near the river, was attracted by
the cries of the other children and
arrived in time to see his son disap-
pear beneath the water. A friend
attempted to locate the body but
it was 45 minutes before it could
be found. A physician was unable
to resuscitate him. The drowning
occurred almost at the foot of the
business section of the city and many
assembled on the banks to assist in
the work of rescue. The boy's fun-
eral will be held tomorrow morning
at the Baptist church.

Springfield, July 13.—The Spring-
field city council met last evening to
open bids for the paving, but were
deferred from this action by the fail-
ure of bids to appear. It is not known

companies have sent representatives
here. The council will meet again
tonight to discuss the paving matters
and on Saturday will leave in a body
for Salem and Portland to inspect
the various kinds of hard surface
pavement before adopting any kind
for this city. On Monday night the
council will again meet to let the
paving contract. Mayor Sutton de-
clares that if no bids are offered, the
city will undertake the work itself,
as it has the macadamizing of its
residence streets, and will employ a
competent man to superintend the
work.

the bids were opened, but this is in-

PORTLAND MAN AND WIFE TO COOS BAY ON ONE MOTORCYCLE

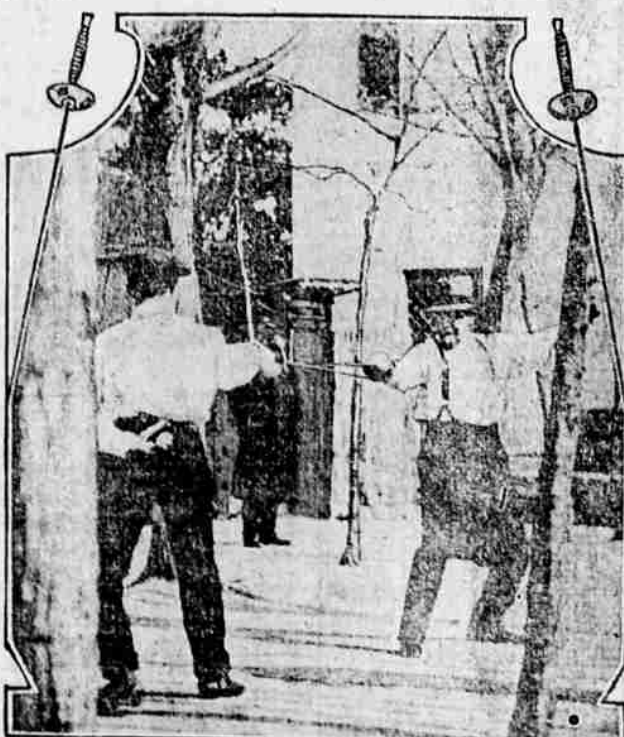
Mr. and Mrs. Selander Stop in
