GIGANTIC MOTORCYCLE

PARADE AT BUFFALO

Machines From All Over the
Country Appeared This
Morning

Buffalo, N. Y., July 14.—Motorcyclists from all over the country paraded through the streets of Buffalo this morning, thousands of people witnessing the novel spectacle. Interest in motorcycling as a sport has been spreading rapidly during the past year and an unprecedented field of entrants will take part in the annual race meet of the Federation of American Motorcyclists at Fort Erie this afternoon and tomorrow.

The racing card is sure to be the most exciting in the history of the federation. The feature will be the amateur motorcycle championships of the United States. A special silver cup will be presented to the rider who accomplishes the most consistent performance in the three championship races to be run during the meet, the winner to bear the title of amateur champion of America.

The victor will be decided by the point system, the winner of the one-mile championship race to receive five points, the second three points, and the third two points. The winner of the ten-mile championship race will receive six points, the second four points, and the third two points. The winner of the one-hour championship race will receive ten points, the second five points, and the third three points. It will be necessary for the winner of the trophy to take part in all three events, and even the man who wins

RACES ARE CALLED OFF

Chicago, July 13.—The two-weeks' race meeting scheduled to begin at Hawthorne track tomorrow was called off today.

LOCAL OPTION ON

SUNDAY BASEBALL IS NEW YORK PLAN

Albany, N. Y., July 13.—The upper house of the New York state legislature has passed a bill providing for local option on the question of Sunday baseball. A similar measure is pending in the lower house, and its backers are confident that it will pass. According to the bill, a petition signed by 5 per cent of the voters in a city, town or village calls for a vote in the proposition, and a majority of the votes cast decides the question. If the electors favor Sunday games, the place and time of playing them are left to the discretion of the local authorities.

The source of information is the State and City Section of the Commercial and Financial Chronicle, dated May 17, 1911, published in New York, and accepted *an authority* by all banks and financial houses--*the very people who buy city bonds.*

There are no up-to-date government reports which give this class of information. The last government figures are for 1903, or nine years old.
