GOOD REASON FOR SWIPING THE MAP

Washington, July 15.—The map which mysteriously disappeared from the files of the war department is the one showing the Controlling Bay entries made by Richard S. Ryan, agent for the Gunpowder interests in Alaska, and that it was physically impossible for such a bona fide map to reach Washington within 15 days after the entry had actually been made, was confirmed by Gifford Pinchot, formerly chief forester.

Regarding Miss Abbott's story of the map, Pinchot today said: "Miss Abbott asked me to inspect the terminal map at the war department, and called by attention to the fact that the map was here December 15, although the survey of the land around the bay on which the entry was made was not concluded until December 1. I called Secretary Stinson's attention to the matter immediately, and the map was thoroughly inspected and discussed."

HOTTEST PERIOD SINCE 1888 SAYS BEALS

Government Thermometer in Portland Goes to 97—Over 100 at Other Places.

Portland, July 18.—From 3 o'clock until 5, Sunday the official government thermometer stood at 97. The period from last Wednesday to yesterday, Mr. Beals says, has been hotter than any other five days since 1888, and was only a trifle cooler than any like period since 1857.

The hot days of 1888 came between July 17 and 21, when the following maximum temperature were recorded: July 17, 97 degrees; July 18, 96 degrees; July 19, 98 degrees; July 20, 97 degrees; July 21, 94 degrees. The record for the present hot spell has been: July 12, 91 degrees; July 13, 97 degrees; July 14, 92 degrees; July 15, 94 degrees; July 16, 97 degrees. The highest temperature on record was attained July 30, 1907, and again July 23, 1891.

The day was by far the hottest of the present siege, despite the fact that the record of 97 degrees made Thursday was not surpassed. The maximum temperature held to 97 degrees steadily for the two hours and then went down in comparatively small jumps in the evening hours. At 6 p. m. the temperature had dropped only two degrees. At

7 p. m. it had gone to 92 degrees and at 7:40 had barely touched 91. At Various Cities.

ROSEBURG THERMOMETER REGISTERS 106; EQUALS RECORDS OF '94 AND '05

Roseburg, Or., July 17.—The thermometer registered 106 here Saturday. A steady breeze tempered the torridity to bearable extent. It was the hottest day since 1900. Roseburg's hottest day on record was in August, 1894, and July 19, 1905, when it was also 106. Wednesday it was 95, Thursday 89 and Friday 94. Rain fell Thursday, making it sultry. A breeze the other days made existence comfortable.

PORTLAND MAN HIGHEST MAN AT STATE RIFLE SHOOT AT CLACKAMAS

Sergeant O. A. Stevens of Company B, Won State Individual Match.

Portland, July 17.—Competing for medals and trophies offered by the state, National Guard riflemen from all parts of Oregon are assembled at the Clackamas station, rifle range. There are 110 competitors in all, and for the past three days the rattle of musketry has continued from sunrise to sunset.

The contestants represent the pick of the 1400 Infantrymen of the state military service. With the remarkable score of 270 points out of 300 possible at eight different ranges, Sergeant O. A. Stevens, of Company B, Portland, won the state individual match yesterday, and thus gained the individual championship of the Oregon Guard.

In the new skirmish run with battle lights only, Sergeant Stevens rolled up a total of 86 out of 100 points possible. The ranges in this difficult test are 600 yards, 500, 400, 350, 300 and 200, the firing being done while the marksmen advances on the target.

Following the individual match the state team match, which will determine the team championship of the state, was taken up. The ranges of fire are 200, 600 and 100 yards slow fire, 200 yards rapid fire and a skirmish run. Competition is keen and unusually high scores are being made. Not until late today will the team match be concluded.

The annual meet will end tomorrow with the Governor's trophy match, in which teams of eight men each representing the two Oregon regiments will throw out the matter of regimental team superiority.
