WILL EXTEND FREE MAIL SERVICE TO SUBURBS

Postmaster Page Writes That
Arrangements Are Being
Made to That Effect.

Editor Guard: With reference to the extension of the free delivery service, will say: I have, in connection with a representative of the postal department, just finished making a canvass of the city to ascertain what territory was entitled to free delivery. The department requires that all streets should be numbered, signs on cross streets, and that the people in the new districts to be taken in shall have their houses numbered and receptacles for receiving their mail. Until this is completed the department will not extend the service. I conferred with Mayor Frank J. Berger, who informed me that the cross streets would be put into shape at once for the new service. I have to make my final report to the department early in August. If these improvements are made by the above mentioned time, we will not have trouble in getting the delivery extension asked for. The new territory to be taken in is as follows: Several blocks on West sixth street, west of Tyler street. Several blocks on Blair street, North of Fourth street. Several blocks on Adams street, north of fourth street. Several blocks on Monroe street, north of Fourth street. West on 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th and 11th, and 12th streets, to Van Buren street. Harrison avenue, Stewart avenue and Oregon avenue, south of 13th street to 19th street. South of 13th on Alder street to 21st street. Several blocks in Fairmount, including Fairmount blvd., Walnut avenue and Beach avenue. It is the request of the department that every one within the carrier district have receptacles for receiving their mail, thereby making it better for the carrier, and the patrons of the office as well. The time is not very far hence, when the department will make this compulsory. Any one living off to one side of the new territory can have their mail delivered by placing boxes within the carrier's district. To conclude will say, there will not be any trouble in getting the delivery extension asked for, if the people and city will only comply with the requirements.

WOMAN WITNESSES

HER HUSBAND'S DEATH IN WILLAMETTE

Ralph, K. Kennedy, Employed
on Government Dredge,
Drowned.

Salem, Or., July 18.—Hurled from the side of a scow over the swirling waters of the Eola bar, Ralph K. Kennedy, first mate of the government dredge, Champo, was drowned in the Willamette river yesterday afternoon. Every effort to recover his body has proved futile, although for hours a large number of men have been searching.

Kennedy's wife, standing on the dredge, witnessed the tragedy. Kennedy was on a wood scow attached to the launch of the dredge. The scow suddenly turned in the river, striking the dredge with considerable force. As it struck Kennedy lunged over the side.

Captain Moss of the dredge is unable to say whether he intended to jump on to the launch or in the water, but he was hurled into the stream and disappeared under the launch and has not been seen since.

Charles W. Brown, an employee on the dredge, jumped headlong into the river after Kennedy, but failed to find a trace of him. Kennedy's home was in Newport, Wash. He was bringing his wife down the river on the dredge as a holiday trip and she was accompanied by Miss Lois Miller, who resides in the East, and had been visiting Mrs. Kennedy.

The Masons, of which fraternity Mr. Kennedy was a member, have sent to Portland to secure the services of a diver who is expected tomorrow to scour the river for the body.

EXPERTS MAKE STUDY OF REFERENDUM PETITIONS

Salem, Or., July 17.—With the aid of Paul S. Dick, teller of the United States National bank, and David W. Ross, of the First National bank of Portland, Judge W. T. Slater is proceeding with the investigation of the referendum petition against the educational appropriation which are declared to be illegal for the reason that many fraudulent names are signed. Neither Judge Slater nor the two expert accountants will divulge what discoveries have been made, if any, and say there will be nothing to give out for a number of days yet. Judge Slater is confident, however, that he will find ample proof of fraud in the petitions and believes that the referendum petitions are worthless.

AUTO TRUCKS TO CARRY MAIL TO COOS BAY

Marshfield, Or., July 17.—Contractor Barnard, who carries the mail between this city and Roseburg, is putting on auto trucks to be used in place of the old stages. The autos will be able to make much better time. There is a stretch of 11 miles in the mountains over which the autos cannot conveniently travel and there the mail will be carried on a stage, the autos being operated from each end. The auto trucks will run out of Sumner and the mail between that place and Marshfield is carried on a river boat.
