DR. NORTH CONFIDENT OF HIS RELEASE

Man Arrested for Murder of Philomath Woman Expects Freedom.

Corvallis, Or., July 18.—Confident in the belief that the charge of murdering Mrs. Eliza Griffith near Philomath, June 2, will fall flat at his preliminary examination tomorrow, Edward North said tonight that he expected his freedom within a few days. The prosecuting attorney's office here gave out the statement today that if evidence offered at the hearing tomorrow was convincing North would be bound over to the grand jury. North's arrest has been brought about largely through a detective agency.

The body of Mrs. Griffith was found in a pond a quarter of a mile from her home on June 6. The house had been ransacked and robbery was assigned as the motive of the crime. The day before the murder Mrs. Griffith had sold the farm on which she was living and it was generally known about the neighborhood that she was to receive \$1000 cash besides mortgage notes.

North was arrested yesterday on his home in Lincoln county where he had made no secret of his going. Suspicion was first directed against North by information furnished by a minister at whose house North was staying. Rev. Mr. Rose, of Milwaukee, Or., said that he had heard the dentist mourning as though he were remorseful for some terrible deed and that he had seen a blood-stained handkerchief in his possession.

GUN WILL SHOOT BEYOND HORIZON

Battleship Will Be Able to Send Projectile Fifteen Miles.

Washington, July 18.—A gun that will carry its projectile clear out of sight is the style that is to be placed in the turrets of the new battleships of the New York type. One of these guns has been made at the Washington factory and a dozen others are to follow as rapidly as the great lathes can turn them out.

The gun has been tried out at the proving ground and has shown that it is without doubt the most powerful naval weapon in the world. With a muzzle velocity of 2400 feet a second, the shell will have a range of about 14 to 15 miles, consequently it will land far beyond the horizon at extreme elevations. It might hit a ship that the gunners could not see, a friend or an enemy, perhaps. Hence the ordnance officers will be unusually careful when ships mounting these great guns go out for target practice.

Roseburg Lad now Training to Box Ex-Champion Light-Weight of World.

Medford, Or., July 18.—It's on! Over the long distance telephone yesterday Walter McCallum received the acceptance from Battling Nelson which will give Medford the best boxing exhibit ever seen in Southern Oregon.

The time is July 28. The place the Medford opera house. And the principals Tom Gaffney, of Roseburg, and Battling Nelson, of Hecawich, Ill.

It will be for ten rounds, 132 pounds at the ringside. This is a little low for Gaffney, who fought Frankie Edwards at 137, but the former champion insists upon the weight.

If possible, a special train will be run from Grants Pass, bringing the crowds from that city, Central Point and Gold Hill, and a large delegation from Eugene, where Gaffney is now training, is expected.

Nelson will arrive next Thursday. He will train at Frankie Edwards' gymnasium, and many sharp bouts with the Nat instructor will be pulled off to the delight of fistie enthusiasts.

Nelson will have a guarantee of \$500 and 65 per cent of the receipts that run over that amount.

Roseburg has already sent in applications for fifty seats and from present indications an addition will have to be put on the Medford opera house to accommodate the crowd.
