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WETS AND DRIES BATTling FOR SUPREMACY

Maine and Texas Enter Upon Campaign Over the Liquor Question.

Washington, July 20.—In the far northeast and the extreme southwest of Uncle Sam's dominion, the "wets" and "drys" of the nation are now engaged in two of the most important battles ever waged in this country over the liquor question.

In Texas, which now has local option, the "drys" have inaugurated a campaign for statewide prohibition that will be voted on day after tomorrow. The campaign battle for and against has been hard fought by both sides.

In Maine, the pioneer prohibition state, which for sixty years has made the manufacture and sale of intoxicants a crime, a campaign is now on to abrogate the prohibitory amendment to the constitution and restore the licensed saloon. The election to decide the matter will be held September 11.

In both states the National Anti-Saloon league and other temperance forces of the country at large have supplied speakers, literature and money to the "dry" forces, and in both states the national organizations of liquor dealers, brewers and distillers have assisted the "wets".

In the Lone Star state the campaign will be over tomorrow and nothing will be left but the counting of the ballots, but in Maine the battle is just beginning in earnest. The "drys" declare that the present campaign is by no means to be considered a state issue solely, but that the defeat of prohibition in Maine would be a blow to the temperance movement throughout the United States and the world. It would be a confession, they say, that after a trial of more than half a century prohibition has been a failure, and would effectively stop the tide of prohibition that has swept over the country during the last few years.

While the Texans are seeking to establish a condition similar to that which has so long prevailed in Maine, the people of the latter state will vote on a plan for inaugurating its local option system in vogue in Texas. The program of the Maine "wets" provides for strict license of saloons in towns and cities which demand self-government, the open and legal sale of intoxicants and a general adoption of the option plan whereby the voters of each community may decide the liquor question for themselves.

Mrs. Lillian N. Stevens, president of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, is one of the leaders of the "dry" forces, and has an able co-laborer in George W. Norton, editor of the Portland Express and the Portland Advertiser, influential journals owned by a son of Neal Dow, the father of Maine's prohibitory law.

The Maine Non-Partisan Local Self-Government league has been organized to carry on the local option campaign. Tons of literature, in which it is alleged that the "speak-easies" and other places for the illegal sale of liquor have made Maine a disgrace among states, have been circulated. Local option sentiments of President Taft, Dr. Lyman Abbott, Gov. Woodrow Wilson, former President Elliot of Harvard, Rear Admiral "Bob" Evans, Cardinal Gibbons and other famous men have been printed and spread broadcast. While the league is non-partisan, and men of all parties have joined in the propaganda, it is generally admitted that it was the Democratic victory in Maine last fall which made possible the resubmission of the prohibition amendment. To that extent it is a Democratic measure, and should the developments of Sept. 11 prove that the majority of the people of Maine favor a return to the saloon, it will to a certain extent be a Democratic victory.

CIVIL WAR VETERANS URGES BURIAL OF FLAG

New York, July 20.—Declaring that public burial of the confederate flag should form the most impressive ceremony at the reunion of the blue and gray at Bull Run, and denouncing the blending of the two battle flags during the reunion, resolutions were adopted today by the Fayette Post G. A. R., at Brooklyn.

The resolutions were as follows: "Resolved, that the most impressive ceremony at the blue and gray reunion at Bull Run should be the digging of a broad, deep grave in the soil of the battlefield, in which the confederate flag could be publicly buried. At such a ceremony it would be just and proper that President Taft should preside and that the commanders-in-chief of the blue and the gray should participate."

A copy of the resolutions was sent to President Taft. Denunciation of the blending of the two battle flags during the reunion was embodied in a separate resolution.

OUT-FIELDER MAKES SENSATIONAL TRIPLE PLAY YESTERDAY

Only One of Its Kind Ever Made in Baseball Game on Coast.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 19.—Walter Carlisle, Vernon's center fielder, made one of the greatest plays in the history of baseball in the game yesterday between Vernon and Los Angeles. It was an unassisted triple play—the first in the history of the Coast baseball ever accomplished by an out-fielder.

Akin was at bat. Moore was on second and Metzger on first. Hogan put Stewart in to pitch at this stage. Akin swung at the ball and connected. A low fly sailed out over the second baseman's head. It resembled a liner rather than a fly, and it looked safe to every one. Moore and Metzger started around the bases like jackrabbits.

As the ball cracked from Akin's bat Carlisle started in from his station on what looked like a hopeless task. The ball was flying so low and making for the ground so rapidly that Carlisle's try seemed impossible. With a dive the ball went down at his feet. With one last effort Carlisle went down head first, scooping the ball within a half inch of the ground. He rolled over three times and landed on his feet.

At a glance the situation flashed upon the center fielder. Making a detour toward first to head off Metzger from running back, he ran in retired Moore, who was on third. With Metzger a prisoner on second, Carlisle went on an easy dog trot and touched first, making the third out.

JOHNSON SAYS HE DOES NOT FANCY U. S.

New York, July 19.—"Would I fight for America? No, I would not," says Jack Johnson, heavyweight champion of the world. "I would never shoulder a gun for the United States. I would fight for England if she wanted me to and be glad to do it." "Johnson will have to explain when he comes back," is the general cry from the newspaper ringsters. "But," they wearily add, "he'll have a good talk ready."
