### PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the Common Council of the City of Eugene caused to be submitted to the legal voters of said city at a special election duly held in said city on the 17th day of July, 1911, an amendment to the City Charter of said city known as section 140, authorizing the Common Council to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City of Eugene to the amount of fifty-seven thousand (\$57,000.00) dollars, for the purpose of adding to the lighting system heretofore provided by said city, for betterment of the city, for laying mains from the pumping station to the reservoirs and for the extension and general improvement of water mains, and for the purpose of buying additional pumps for the city of Eugene.

Whereas, the votes cast at said election have been canvassed by the canvassing board of said city, and whereas it appears from said canvass that there was a total of 833 votes cast at said election on amendment, 633 voting for said amendment and 200 voting against said amendment, there being a majority of 278 in favor of said charter amendment.

Now, therefore, I, F. J. Berger, mayor of the city of Eugene, do hereby declare said section 140, the same having been approved by a majority of those voting thereon, to be in full force and effect as an amendment to the Charter of the City of Eugene, Lane County, Oregon, from the date of said proclamation.
