OKLAHOMA MAN'S LAST WILL IS PECULIAR

Charles Lounsberry Wrote a Poetic Instrument—He Had No Property.

(Daily Oklahoman.)

As a usual thing the thought connected with a will left by a person who has departed this world, is that it is a legal document, prepared by a legal advisor, for the purpose of disposing of worldly possessions in the manner pleasing to its maker, without interference from the courts. But a document recently came to light, which was given the name of will by its maker, yet it needed no legal procedure to be probated, nor could it be broken by the courts. In fact it was a beautiful poem in prose.

The remarkable document was left by an insane man, Charles Lounsberry by name, who lived at one time in Oklahoma City and died more than a year ago at an institution for the insane in this state. The paper drawn up, as he wished it, later was found among some of his possessions by a friend, as he had no family or relatives to which they should be returned. Lounsberry, before losing his mental reason, was an ordinary business man, engaged in the writing of insurance. As far as known, he never attempted to write for publication, nor was he educated better than the average person. The loss of his reason, it seems, merely took the freakish form of causing his brain to create the phrases which he wrote down and named his last will and testament.

Happiness His Estate.
In this case, the insanity far overreached the man's previous sanity, yet it did not take the form which ordinarily would be expected. Some insane people are obsessed with the idea that they own all the riches and wealth of the world, and they might be expected to devise a peculiar manner of disposing of it after their death. But it was not so with Mr. Lounsberry. He admitted that he had no worldly possessions, and his estate, according to his idea, consisted of the "true sources of happiness, the kind which nature provides. The will was as follows:

"I, Charles Lounsberry, being of sound mind and disposing memory, do hereby make and publish this my last will and testament in order as justly may be to distribute my interest in the world among succeeding men.

"That part of my interest which is known in law, and recognized in the sheep bound volumes as my property, being inconsiderable and of no account, I make no disposal of in this my will.

"My right to live, being but a life estate, is not at my disposal, but these things excepted, all else in the world I now proceed to devise and bequeath.

"I give to good fathers and mothers in trust for their children, all good little words of praise and encouragement, and all quaint pet names and endearments, and I charge said parents to use them justly and generously, as the needs of their children may require.

"I leave to the children, exclusively, but only for the term of their childhood, all and everyone, the flowers of the fields and the blossoms of the woods with the right to play among them freely according to the customs of children, the banks of brooks, and the golden sands beneath the waters thereof, and the odors of the willows that dip therein, and the white clouds that float high over the giant trees. And I leave to children the long, long days in which to be merry a thousand ways, and the night and the moon, and the rain of the Milky way at which wonder, but subject nevertheless to the rights hereinafter given to lovers.

Requests to Lovers.
"I devise to boys jointly all the useful idle, fields and commons where ball may be played, all pleasant waters where one may swim, and all the streams and ponds where one may fish, or where, when grim winter comes, one may skate; to have and to hold the same for the period of their boyhood. And all streams with the clover blossoms and the butterflies thereof, the woods and its appurtenances, the

squirrels and the birds, the echoes and strange noises, and all distant places which may be visited, together with the adventures there found. And to give to said boys, each his own place at the fireside at night, with all pictures that may be seen in the burning wood, to enjoy without let or hindrance, and without any embarrassment of care.

"To lovers, I devise their imaginary world, with whatever they may need, as the stars of the sky, the red roses by the wall, the bloom of the hawthorne, the sweet strains of music and aught else by which they may desire to figure to each the lastness and beauty of their love.

"To young men jointly, I devise and bequeath all boisterous and inspiring sports of rivalry and I give them all disdain of weakness and undoubted confidence in their own strength, though they are rude. I give to them the power to make lasting friendship, and of possessing companions, and to them exclusively, I give all merry songs and brave choruses to sing with lusty voices.

"To those who no longer are children, or youths or lovers, I leave memory, and I bequeath to them the volumes of poems of Burns and Shakespeare and of other poets, if they have others, to the end that they may live over the old days again, freely and fully without tithing diminution.

"To our loved ones with snowy crowns, I bequeath the happiness of old age, the love and gratitude of their children, until they fall asleep."

HEAVY FALL COLORIST TRAVEL IS EXPECTED
It is expected that another large influx of settlers will be brought to the Pacific northwest in the fall, as a result of the colonist rates that have been authorized by the leading transcontinental railroads. One-way second class fares will be in effect from the east to points in the Pacific northwest from September 15 to October 15, inclusive.

To give an idea of how cheap it will be possible to come to the Pacific coast to points from principal eastern cities, the following are cited: Atlanta, Ga., \$46.95; Baltimore, Md., \$49.75; Boston, \$50.15; New York, \$50; Chicago, \$33; St. Louis, \$32; Minneapolis, \$25. Pacific northwesterners having friends or acquaintances in the east who want to come to this part of the country, are urged to write them, calling attention to these exceptionally low fares, at once, in order that they can make plans to take advantage of them.—Journal.

AVENGING CHICKEN, LAD SHOTS WOMAN

Boy Ambushes Autoists and Sends Fatal Bullet After One.

South Norwalk, Conn., July 20.—Miss Eva Hammond, of Coaticook, Canada, lies today at the home of her uncle here with a bullet lodged against the base of her brain. Her body is paralyzed, and there is little hope that she will survive. She was shot while automobile riding late yesterday, and William Beers, a 12-year-old boy, is accused of having caused the injury.

Young Beers told the police that a passing automobile ran over his pet bantam chicken a day or two ago, and he had lain in ambush "to avenge the death of his favorite." With a small rifle in his hand, he hid in the bushes and determined to shoot a hole through the tire of every automobile that went by. This, he said, was his idea of revenge.

Miss Hammond's car was the first to pass. The lad aimed at the tire, but the bullet veered off and landed in the young woman's neck.

PARKISON SAID TO BE IN CHICAGO

Salem, July 20.—Although advice received here indicate that H. J. Parkison is in Chicago, instead of in California, where he said he intended to visit his mother, ex-Justice W. T. Slater said today that there will be no attempt to bring him back here in connection with the suit to save the appropriation for the University of Oregon from the operation of the referendum.

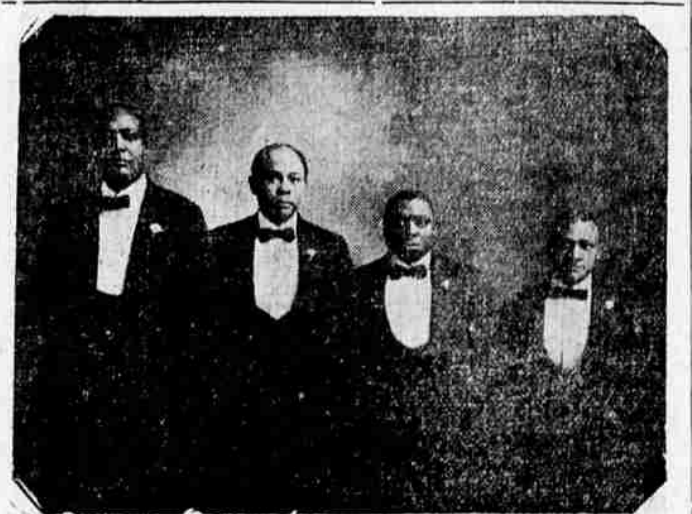
