NEW ENTERPRISE AT MARCOLA IS PORCH COLUMN FACTORY

Duncan Brothers Are Working up Good Business with Their Plant.

Marcola, July 21.—A new enterprise is being carried on here by Duncan Bros., who deserve encouragement and certainly merit the success that is coming their way in a very satisfactory manner. Nearly a year ago they entered into an arrangement with Flecher Lumber company and began the manufacture of porch posts and fancy columns. Their factory is in connection with the company's planing mill, using the same power, and gets its material from the company. Already about twenty carloads of finished work have been shipped to eastern points, some as far east as Pitting, Pa., and orders keep coming in so that the factory has its output spoken for ahead all the time. They are planning extensive factory additions, the putting in of more improved machinery and employing a larger force of skilled workmen. The present output is chiefly in the smaller sized columns and their new machinery will equip them for making colonial columns and other large patterned columns. They are now using three turning lathes and one boring machine, and the fact that the proprietors are skilled workmen in their line assures the success of their enterprise, which by the way we are informed is the only establishment of its kind in the state of Oregon. Such establishments using raw material from Lane county's inexhaustible resources in that line are what this country needs, and Marcola may justly be considered a very valuable addition to its already well established reputation as a point of more than ordinary industrial activity.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC'S SYSTEM OF PENSIONS

Since the inauguration of the pension department of the Southern Pacific company, January 1, 1903, nearly one million dollars has been voluntarily disbursed among the retired employees of the corporation. The precise amount is \$550,607.70. The total disbursements for the month of June, 1911, were \$146,103.55. This was divided among 420 men and women, retired employees of the Southern Pacific company. The total disbursements for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1911, were \$1,683,000.20. Since the organization of the pension department the Southern Pacific company has pensioned 615 of its employees. Of this number 135 were from the operating and train service, 248 from the motive power department, including engineers, 192 from the maintenance of way, 7 from the stores department, 61 from the general office, 22 from the Atlantic steamship lines and 21 from the ferry and river steamers. Length of service is all that is necessary to secure a pension from the Southern Pacific company. The employees are not required to contribute anything toward the pension fund, all payments being made out of the general fund of the railroad company.

Dr. W. L. Cheshire, surgeon for the Utah Construction company, who is in Eugene today, says the work of laying rails on the new Natron extension has ceased a short distance above Blakelyville, because the graders have not finished their work at that point and for a considerable distance above. He says he has heard of no reports to the effect that the company intends to establish a passenger service over the completed portion of the new line.

Brown Hansard, formerly of Springfield, but who has been in Canada for several months, was arrested in Eugene last night soon after he stepped off the local train, on the charge of violating the local option law. The night police saw him on the street corner waiting for a car to Springfield, and notified Sheriff Downs, who placed him under arrest. He put up cash bail and came over to Eugene today, and furnished bail on each of the three indictments against him. The grand jury indicted him at the last term of the circuit court.

OHIO HEALTH BOARD IS PROGRESSIVE

Cleveland, July 22.—The Ohio state board of health, in session here, adopted a resolution recommending the introduction of sex hygiene in the public schools. The Ohio board is the first in the country to recommend the fearless handling of this subject.
