FORMER EUGENE WOMEN SUFFER FROM FIRE

Mrs. Barnard and Mrs. Conoyer Lose Their Millinery Stock at Medford.

Mrs. Kittie Barnard and Mrs. Conoyer, formerly of Eugene, who have been in the millinery business in Medford for the past three years, lost their stock by fire a few days ago. The following partial account of the fire is from the Medford Sun: "Starting in the rear of a fire hole on South Central avenue, a half block from main, a blaze spread so rapidly at 1 o'clock this morning as to threaten for a time buildings in the center of town. After half an hour's work, by playing two streams of water on it, the fire was extinguished, but not until a building was gutted with a loss of \$8,500. The building is the property of Mrs. J. E. Enyart and Mrs. Caranahan, but the loss on it cannot amount to more than \$1,500. The big losers are Barnard and Conoyer, milliners, and J. F. Lawrence, a jeweler. Both firms lost about \$3,000 in stock and fixtures. The Bee Hive restaurant was also loser to about \$700."

GOVERNOR WILL CATCH ESCAPES WITH TRUSTIES

Malom, Or., July 24.—Governor West intends to change the old adage that "it takes a thief to catch a thief" and will act on the belief that it "takes a convict to catch a convict."

Today he said that the next time one of his "honor men" makes a break from the work that has been assigned to him outside of the penitentiary he will select two or three good convicts on whom he believes he can implicitly rely and will send them forth to capture the fugitive.

He will go even farther than that and supply the convicts with guns. "There is not much of a chance to capture an escaped convict unless the man hunting him is armed," said the Governor when asked if his convict-catching convicts would be supplied with weapons.

BOHEMIA MINE YIELDS \$1,000 A DAY

Cottage Grove, Or., July 23.—Reports came in yesterday from the Champion mine, owned by the West Coast Mining company, that they are taking \$1,000 a day from the plates, and only running 10 stamps of their 30-stamp mill at that. The rich shoot is still getting better and the owners are well-pleased with their purchase of last winter.

There is excitement in the Bohemia mining district over the discovery made at the Combination mines, owned by Clark Bros., Sherman Clark, the superintendent, and a force of miners last Tuesday broke into a new shoot of gold bearing rock said to be the richest yet found in the district. The rich ores will be shipped direct to the smelter. The ledge is wide and the walls well defined.

PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the Common Council of the City of Eugene caused to be submitted to the legal voters of said city at a special election duly held in said city on the 17th day of July, 1911, an amendment to the City Charter of said city known as section 140, authorizing the Common Council to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City of Eugene to the amount of fifty-seven thousand (\$57,000.00) dollars, for the purpose of adding to the lighting system heretofore provided, by said city, for betterment of the Power Plant, for laying mains from the pumping station to the reservoirs and for the extension and general improvement of water mains, and for the purpose of buying additional pumps for the city of Eugene.

Whereas, the votes cast at said election have been canvassed by the canvassing board of said city, and whereas it appears from said canvass that there was a total of 938 votes cast at said election on said question, 638 voting for said amendment and 300 voting against said amendment, there being a majority of 278 in favor of said charter amendment.

Now, therefore, I, F. J. Berger, mayor of the city of Eugene do hereby declare said section 140, the same having been approved by a majority of those voting thereon, to be in full force and effect as an amendment to the Charter of the City of Eugene, Lane County Oregon, from the date of said proclamation.

WOMAN 111 YEARS OLD FOUND DOWN IN OLD GEORGIA

Mrs. Mary Trawick Proctor, Real Daughter of Revolution, Born in 1800.

Atlanta, Ga., July 23.—Mrs. Mary Trawick Proctor, 111 years old, a real daughter of the American Revolution, has just been discovered in a humble old cabin in Barlow county, Georgia. Her only companions are her daughter, Miss Mary Proctor, 90 years old, and two great grandchildren, descendants of another daughter.

Mrs. Proctor was born in Wake county, N. C., April 30, 1800. When 19 years old, she was married to Hiram Proctor, veteran of the revolution and the war of 1812. She has lived under the administrations of 28 presidents, including John Adams and William H. Taft. On a bedding of straw, constituting a mattress so thin that the rough plank slats can be seen, this daughter of the revolution lies, her form emaciated, skin wrinkled, and almost a skeleton. Her aged daughter ministers to the wants and necessities of the household, and tills the soil in a small cotton and garden patch nearby. The meager profits derived from this labor she adds to the \$12 a month which Mrs. Proctor receives for the services her husband rendered in the war of 1812. A movement has been started in Atlanta to raise funds sufficient to provide for the two old women the rest of their lives.
