SEDRO-WOOLLEY HAS BAD FIRE

\$200,000 Damage Done in Washington Town Last Night.

Bellingham, Wash., July 25.—Fire which started from an explosion in the hardware and furniture store of Fritz Bros. early last night, swept the two main business blocks of the town of Sedro-Woolley, 35 miles south of here, and caused a loss estimated at \$200,000 covered by about \$100,000 insurance.

dro-Woolley is without electric lights tonight. The water and telephone systems also were badly damaged. Had the fire not been checked on the east by a tuft of maple trees and on the west by a vacant lot, the whole city would have been destroyed. The volunteer department battled against the flames valiantly, but their efforts were hampered by lack of water pressure.

Some of the establishments destroyed were those of Fritz Bros. Hardware & Furniture Company, S. A. grocery store, Vienna Bakery, Union Mercantile company, Red Front clothing store, Hatchford's furniture store, Hohn's livery stable, Mott's drugstore, Dahl's pool-room and confectionery store, Clark's clothing store and a number of minor establishments. Several persons are reported injured by falling debris, but none seriously.

OREGON APPLES TO FEED CHINESE

Government May Send Experts to the State to Study Culture.

Pekin, July 25.—It is stated upon very good authorities that the government is considering a plan to send a corps of agricultural experts to the United States in the early autumn to study the apple growing industry, with a view to adding it to the industries of China.

The excellence of the Oregon and Washington apple is well known in several Chinese cities, due largely to the holiday gifts of apples sent by James J. Hill, Maurice Thomsen and others who have important commercial connections. At present the apple is a luxury beyond the reach of even the well-to-do Chinamen, but those who have tasted the fruit are so delighted with it, that they are willing to encourage any plan that will tend to develop apple growing in China.

It is said that Messrs. Hill, Thomsen and other prominent Americans have expressed a willingness to do all in their power to encourage the project. The expedition will probably sail the latter part of September or early in October and confine its visit to the States of Washington and Oregon.

GIRL GIVES SWIMMING LESSON, THEN DROWNS

Aberdeen, Wash., July 26.—While swimming in Wynoochee river, Miss Geneva Shields of Montesano, the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Shields, was drowned. She had been teaching her little cousin to swim, but had put him on the bank and gone for another swim herself. She gave a cry for help and sank. The child called men to help but life was gone when the body was recovered. Miss Shields was very popular in the younger social set here and in Montesano.

FIRE EAST OF ALBANY ARE STILL SPREADING

Fire Warden eLave to Assist in Work of Fighting Flames.

Albany, Or., July 25.—T. H. Watkins, of Albany, supervising fire warden for Linn county and Assistant State Fire Warden Stewart, of Salem, left Albany today by automobile for Mill City to assist in fighting the forest fire which destroyed the Curtiss Lumber company's logging camp No. 6, eight miles southeast of that town. The fire made headway all day, but is reported to have made comparatively small inroad on green timber. It is now turning toward the south and east, burning most rapidly in the direction of Quartzville.

The office of the United States Forestry service in this city today received a report, sent direct from the fire last night, that it had then covered a territory more than three miles long and two miles wide, but the fire zone has widened rapidly today.

Fire Origin Incendiary.
Medford, Or., July 25.—Suspecting that a large fire started a few days ago near Butt Falls in the holdings of the Crater Lake Lumber company was started by an incendiary, Edgar Hafer, manager of the company, is offering \$100 reward for the capture of the person or persons. The fire was set under control by the Jackson County Fire Patrol association. It was discovered that the blaze had started in a pile of cuttings about 20 feet from the road leading to Butte Falls.

THE HAY CROP OF OREGON WILL REACH MILLION TONS

"The farmers of Oregon are harvesting the largest hay crop in the history of the state," says Dr. James Withycombe, director of the experiment station at the Oregon Agricultural College, discussing the present harvest.

"The total hay crop of Oregon last year represented 900,000 tons, but this year it will reach 1,100,000 tons. The western Oregon crop is 50 per cent larger than it was last year, and the eastern Oregon crop about 10 percent larger. The difference in percentage is mostly due to the fact that in eastern Oregon the crop is grown on irrigated or sub-irrigated land, while that in western Oregon is grown under natural conditions, and the season has been favorable for hay, as well as for other farm crops."
