## MILES OF TIMBER IN LIAISON SWEEP BY FLAMES

Big Blaze on Thomas Creek, East of Scio, Doing Great Damage.

Albany, Or., July 26.—Having already swept over an area three miles long and one mile wide, a most disastrous fire, which strayed yesterday on the headwaters of Thomas Creek, about 14 miles east of Scio, is reported here to be rapidly getting beyond control of the men now engaged in fighting it.

The valuable green timber in which this particular fire is raging is owned by the Holland, Briggs & Avery Timber company, of Portland.

A patrolman for this company has a crew of 19 men fighting the fire, which is in an extensive belt of heavy timber and is apt to become a bad fire unless stopped soon.

Another fire in Linn County. This makes the second forest fire now burning in Linn County. The other one has been burning several days southeast of Mill City. A big crew of fire fighters from the Curtis lumber company's mills, assisted by government rangers, has been fighting this fire continually, but has not yet checked it.

Officials of the Curtis company assert that this fire, which swept out the Curtis company's logging camp No. 6, and greatly damaged its logging railroad, has damaged but little green timber and has been confined almost entirely to an old burn and logged-off lands.

N. F. McDuff, forest supervisor of the Santiam district, with headquarters here, will leave in the morning for Mill City to take charge of the efforts to prevent a spread of the fire. He also may visit the scene of the fire on the headwaters of Thomas Creek.

Campers Caught Near Fire. A forest fire which started at the mouth of French Creek, on the south side of the Breitenbush river, three miles from Detroit, early today, is now reported to be under control. A report which reached this city late in the afternoon direct from the men fighting the fire stated that the flames would soon be extinguished.

This fire was in a zone of remarkably heavy timber and the prompt work of stopping it has prevented a heavy loss. The blaze was serious in that it was along the only trail to the Breitenbush hot springs, where many people are now encamped.

The trail was cut off by the fire today, but, according to tonight's report, it will probably be open tomorrow.

## BODY OF MAN FOUND IN RIVER AFTER SEVERAL MONTHS

Albany, Or., July 26.—After being in the middle fork of the South Santiam river for several months, the body of Thomas Band, 32, was found ten miles above Foster yesterday. Coroner Fortmiller left for Foster today to hold an inquest, and, if possible, to clear up the mystery of the man's disappearance.

Bond disappeared last December while hunting and prospecting in the mountains about 20 miles above Foster. A search of several days was made for him without success. A report was made to local officers that there were some circumstances about his disappearance indicating foul play, but it was more generally believed that he must have accidentally fallen in the river while crossing on some logs. The stream was searched for miles, but nothing was learned until the decreasing waters of the river disclosed his body ten miles down stream, from where he is supposed to have fallen into it.

## WOMAN'S FEET ARE GROWING LARGER

Is Statement Made By Delegate to Show Dealers' Conception Today

New York, July 27.—That women's feet are growing larger, not only in Chicago but in this city and throughout the country, was the statement made by a delegate to a convention of shoe dealers here today. The athletic activities of the modern woman is given as the explanation of the phenomenon. Dealers say that whereas ten or fifteen years ago a No. 2 shoe was frequently called for, there is now practically no sale for footwear of so small a size. No. 4 and No. 5 shoes are now more worn by the fair sex than any other sizes.

It is interesting to learn that, while women's feet are growing, the pedal extremities of men are becoming smaller. Twice as many No. 6 shoes for men are sold now than twenty years ago, and the demand for eleven and twelve, once fairly constant, is now rare. The reverse of the same explanation applies here—that men are less active and athletic than their fathers. It is even predicted that the time may come when the pedal extremities of both sexes will be of approximately the same size.

## NEBRASKANS BEGIN THEIR POLITICAL CAMPAIGN TODAY

Omaha, Neb., July 26.—Both democrats and republicans of Nebraska began their state campaign today, following the state conventions. The republicans met in Lincoln and the democrats in Fremont to formulate platforms and name the campaign officers. All candidates are chosen in primaries and the law provides a resolution indorsing any candidate. The officers selected by the conventions will not find it necessary to spend weeks in getting their organizations into line, as everything of that kind is placed at their disposal the moment the convention is over. As a result, the preliminary campaigning is in full swing today and will continue without intermission until election day.

The democrats for the first time in many years, are harmoniously organized. Mr. Bryan is on a Chautauqua lecture tour and has had little to say of late regarding local politics. The democrats pin their hopes of success upon the apparent split in the republican ranks. The Nebraska Progressive Republican league was formed by the insurgents some time ago, after a battle for control with the regulars. Later there was a division among the progressives, those who support Taft organizing the reformed Nebraska Progressive Republican league, while the middle-of-the-road progressives oppose the administration. Leaders of the party say that the warring factions will get together before election and keep Nebraska in the republican column.

## \$500,000 ASKED FOR DEFENSE OF M'NAMARAS

Two Million Laborers Are Asked to Contribute 25 Cents Each.

Washington, July 24.—An appeal for \$500,000 funds to defend J. J. McNamara, the labor union man, accused of dynamiting, has been issued by Secretary Morrison of the American Federation of Labor, to the 2,000,000 members of American labor unions. He suggested that each member contribute 25 cents. It has also been urged that the proceeds of labor day celebrations this year be devoted to "the legal defense of the McNamara case and the prosecution of the kidnappers."

## TYPHOON DESTROYS LIFE AND PROPERTY ON CHINESE COAST

Tokio, July 26.—More than three hundred are believed to have lost their lives in a typhoon which swept Tokyo and Yokohama last night. The property loss is very large. Many fishing boats along the coast are missing.

There are a great many ducks that nest in the sand hills every year and as a result the ponds are full of young birds.
