LAFOLLETTE WOOL \$200,000 PAID BY BILL PASSES SENATE WELCH FOR THE CARVER ROAD

Substitutes for Defeated House Transfer is Straight Sale by
Bill Raises Raw Wool but Carver and Sprinkle
Lowers Woolens. Interests.

Washington, July 27.—The senate passed LaFollette's compromise wool tariff bill for revision, 48 to 32.

The Underwood house wool tariff bill was defeated in the senate today by a vote of 44 to 35. Except of Senator Brown of Nebraska, who voted for the bill, the vote was along strict party lines. LaFollette, by 49 to 31 secured reconsideration of the vote, democrats and insurgents joining in the support of his motion.

LaFollette then offered a modified substitute for his amendment as a compromise between the house bill upon which the democrats and insurgents had agreed.

The Underwood bill provided a general reduction of fifty per cent in the tariff on raw wool and woolens. LaFollette's amendment imposed much higher duty on raw wool but the duties on woolens are reduced about 35 per cent and also alleged inequalities are corrected.

Cotton Postponed.

The Underwood cotton revision bill was reported to the house today by Chairman Underwood of the ways and means committee, but debate was postponed until tomorrow to permit the republicans to file a minority report from the committee.

Washington, July 27.—The investigation will be made either by the monetary commission or the house committee of banking and commercial, probably the latter.

CRESWELL TO GET NEW DEPOT

Southern Pacific Company
Promises Citizens the
Improvement

The promise made by Southern Pacific officials to erect a new depot at Creswell bids fair to be fulfilled this fall according to a communication received last week by Agent A. R. Land. The letter is from the superintendent of the Southern Pacific line in Oregon and states that the necessary allowance has been made for thoroughly remodeling the depot, and there is no doubt in the minds of the local officials but what this improvement will be made as soon as possible. However there are a good deal of arrangements to be made before this can be accomplished, as the matter will have to pass through a great many hands before the change can be authorized.

Just what the alteration will be was not explained to Agent Land but no doubt the company will provide ample room for years to come.

While here interviewing the Development League last spring Superintendent Fields stated that he thought the company would be willing to park the grounds both north and south of the depot site and lay out flower gardens, provided the town or league would care for the same. If the company is still willing to do this the town should cooperate and beautify the ground to every extent possible. If there is a town along the line that needs better freight and passenger facilities, Creswell is the place, and the wonderful increase in the company's business here justifies the erection of a modern depot.—Chronicle.

The Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway company is now in control of the Corvallis & Alsea River Railway company's holdings and the announcement is made that the road between Corvallis and Monroe is to be put into operation as quickly as the roadbed can be made safe for travel, says the Corvallis Times-Gazette.

The ultimate intention is to continue the Carver road to Eugene, and the statement has been made that the Welch interests expect to have electric cars operating between Corvallis and Eugene by Jan. 1, 1912. This hinges only on securing rights-of-way at a reasonable price. If the Monroe capitalists, the Williams and land companies now operating in that vicinity, can deliver the rights-of-way at an early date, as is expected, actual construction work on the connecting link will be begun.

George D. O'Connor, president of the Lane & Benton County Land company, which owns 5000 acres along the proposed route of the electric line from Monroe to Eugene, said this morning that rights-of-way on the Eugene end of the line will be forthcoming at any time the Monroe people make good. While appearing in his statement, Mr. O'Connor, with whom A. Welch is associated as vice-president, left the impression that the line from Corvallis to Eugene is a certainty, and was definite in his statements that the entire C. & A. line is to be electrified immediately.

The papers in the transfer of the C. & A. to the Welch interests were signed at Portland on July 20, by Stephen Carver, president of the Corvallis & Alsea Co., and A. B. Winfree, secretary. The deed and a mortgage covering certain notes and indebtedness were filed with County Recorder Warfield late yesterday afternoon.

The Corvallis & Alsea River Railway company's holdings consisted of the main line of standard gauge road from Corvallis to Monroe, the Glenbrook branch and the Belknap branch, the whole totaling 31 miles of track. The right-of-way on the main line is 60 feet and on the branches from 20 to 50 feet. In the transfer is included "station lots" in Corvallis at the south end of Sixth street, "fractional river front lots, the Fischer mill spur, 2600 feet, and the 500 foot spur connection with the Southern Pacific lines.

The transfer is a straight sale of the Carver and Sprinkle interests, the sum involved being somewhere in the vicinity of \$200,000. The Welch people give the two roads as security and are given ample time in which to make payment.

PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the Common Council of the City of Eugene caused to be submitted to the legal voters of said city at a special election duly held in said city on the 17th day of July, 1911, an amendment to the City Charter of said city known as section 132, authorizing the Common Council to issue negotiable bonds of the City of Eugene to the amount of one hundred and thirty thousand (\$130,000.00) dollars, for refunding the general indebtedness of said city, and

Whereas, the votes cast at said election have been canvassed by the canvassing board of said city, and whereas it appears from said canvass that there was a total of 996

votes cast at said election on said question, 746 voting for said amendment and 250 voting against said amendment, there being a majority of 496 in favor of said charter amendment.

Now, therefore, I, F. J. Berger, mayor of the city of Eugene, do hereby declare said section 132, the same having been approved by a majority of those voting thereon, to be in full force and effect as an amendment to the charter of the city of Eugene, Lane county, Oregon, from the date of said proclamation.
