FROM MEXICO TO CANADA IN LITTLE 10-H. P. FRANKLIN AUTO

Henry Buckley and Wife Are on Path-Finding Trip Along Coast.

Making a trip from Mexico to the Canadian border in a little Franklin 10-horse-power, runabout, Harry Buckley and wife arrived in Eugene last evening and will be here several days. They broke a spring yesterday and came the last 120 miles in that condition. They will wait here until the spring is fixed and will then leave for the north. They left Tia Juana, Mexico in June and have been traveling by easy stages since, stopping for several days at a time at the important cities and towns. At Bakerfield, Cal., Mr. Buckley took part in the 100 mile race and took their place among seven cars entered. The little machine has stood the rough roads excellently and very few repairs have been made. This is remarkable considering that the machine is six years old.

Mr. Buckley and wife expect to go over the same route with a large touring car in the near future in hopes of making a record.

YOUNG MAN DROWNED IN SWEET CREEK

Word has been received in Eugene of the drowning of Raymond Monroe, aged 21 years, in Sweet creek, a tributary of the Siuslaw river, below Mapleton, Thursday of last week. He was in swimming when he suddenly sank in a large hole in the creek and his brothers, who were with him failed to get him out in time to save his life. The remains were interred at Florence Saturday. The young man was the son of David Monroe.

PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the Common Council of the City of Eugene caused to be submitted to the legal voters of said city at a special election duly held in said city on the 17th day of July, 1911, an amendment to the City Charter of said city known as section 140, authorizing the Common Council to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City of Eugene to the amount of fifty-seven thousand (\$57,000.00) dollars, for the purpose of adding to the lighting system heretofore provided by said city, for betterment of the Power Plant, for laying mains from the pumping station to the reservoirs and for the extension and general improvement of water mains, and for the purpose of buying additional pumps for the city of Eugene.

Whereas, the votes cast at said election have been canvassed by the canvassing board of said city, and whereas it appears from said canvass that there was a total of 938 votes cast at said election on said question, 633 voting for said amendment and 305 voting against said amendment, there being a majority of 278 in favor of said charter amendment.

Now, therefore, I, F. J. Berger, mayor of the city of Eugene do hereby declare said section 140, the same having been approved by a majority of those voting thereon, to be in full force and effect as an amendment to the Charter of the City of Eugene, Lane County, Oregon, from the date of said proclamation.
