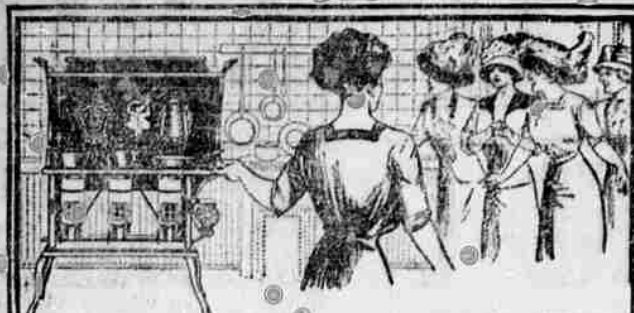

SAVINGS BANKS IN LARGE CITIES

Postal Depositories Opened Today in Principal Cities of Country.

Washington, August 1.—Postal savings depositories, were today opened for business in the main post-offices in four of the principal cities of the country, New York, Chicago, Boston, and St. Louis. More than a thousand postal savings banks are now in successful operation in the smaller cities of the country, but this is the first attempt to extend the system to larger cities.

The four cities were named because of their great population and commercial prominence, and because in each one is located a United States sub-treasury, which will facilitate the heavy banking business that is likely to result from the inauguration of postal banks.

In the smaller cities the greatest patronage has come from foreigners, and that is expected to be the case in New York and the other three big cities. From New York alone last year the money orders sent abroad for foreign born residents amounted to \$9,000,000, and most of this big business was in deposits in the foreign postal savings banks. Immigrants have been the victims of numberless banking frauds and have naturally become afraid of the private savings banks and other financial institutions. Now that Uncle Sam stands back of their deposits, much of the money heretofore sent abroad is expected to remain in this country.

AUTO OWNERS LATE WITH LICENSE FEE

Salem, Cr., July 31.—Postcard acknowledgment of receipts for automobile registration are being prepared by Secretary of State Olcott for the benefit of a large number of motorists who failed to get applications in time to have their license returned before August 1. These cards will not exempt them from arrest but will have the effect of showing intention. About 3,000 autos are registered at present but it is estimated there are fully 5,000 in the state. Because of the excessive rush of the eleventh hour applications the office force will be unable to return the licenses at once. Because of the large number of auto owners in the state 60 days from the date of the law taking effect was allowed for registration. Hundreds have not taken advantage of that time.

HUNTERS OFF FOR THE HILLS

There has been a large exodus from the city during the past few days by camping parties consisting for the most part of men who are anxious to get on a deer train. A season open at midnight last night and today countless nimrods are on the trail of the roamers of the wilds.

THE DALLIES HAS A \$200,000 FIRE

Wasco Warehouse & Milling Company and G. S. Railway Suffered.

The Dallee, Or., July 31.—With an estimated loss of \$200,000, partly covered by insurance, fire supposed to have started from defective wiring in the mill of the Wasco Warehouse & Milling company, last night destroyed the mill, valued at \$120,000, the Great Southern railway depot, valued at \$20,000; the rolling stock in the yards of the O. W. R. & N. Co., valued at several thousand dollars; a section-house, several freight sheds and shacks and a large quantity of hay. The buildings were located at the east end of the main street. The town was threatened by the flames for more than an hour. The wind was from the west, saving the town.

No fatalities accompanied the fire and the only person hurt was an unidentified man, who fell in front of the volunteer hose cart and was run over.

Before the first alarm was given the mill dust, which had been set afire by the wires, exploded and threw flames and burning chaff 250 feet into the air, spreading it over 39 freight-cars of the O. W. R. & N. and the Great Southern railway in the yards, setting fire to them. The cars in the yards were practically all empty.

When the fire department arrived it was found that the fire in the mill was beyond control and the effort was made to save the brewery of the Eastern Oregon Brewing company, across the street from the flour mill. The direction of the wind blew the flames away from the brewery and although at several times caught fire it was saved.

During part of the evening buildings worth approximately \$200,000 and residences in the east end of town, worth about \$20,000 were in danger and a shift of the wind would have wiped them out.
