HOP MARKET UP TO 35 CENTS POUND

Excitement Prevails Among the Dealers and Growers—High for Long Time.

Portland, Aug. 8.—Excitement in the hop market is at fever heat. Prices are climbing rapidly and there is no telling how high they will go. Yesterday there was a sheer jump of 5 cents a pound in Pacific coast prices, which brings the market up to 35 cents. This is 3 cents higher than prices were in the boom year of 1904. In fact, hop values are higher now than they have been at any time since the winter of 1903-04.

No hops were bought yesterday at 35 cents, but the market was firmly established at that figure by bids that were made in California. The 35-cent offers were made by C. C. Donovan, of Santa Rosa, who lifted the market from 25 to 30 cents August 1. According to telegrams received in Portland yesterday Donovan was unable to buy any California hops at 35 cents. At the same time there are holding out for 40 cents.

The Oregon market will, of course, follow the pace set by the buyers in the southern state. Since 30 cents was first paid here last Wednesday over 1,500 bales of the new crop have been bought up.

McNelly Bros. of this city, who were the first to pay 30 cents in Oregon, yesterday made several purchases at this price, which will probably also be the last taken at 30 cents. They obtained 20,000 pounds from White & Son, of Mt. Angel, also three lots aggregating 25,000 pounds in the Aurora section. There was a report current in the local market last night that a 15,000 pound lot had been obtained by a Salem dealer at 31 cents. It was also said on good authority that several options were taken at 32 cents. When the market opened this morning, it was on a 35-cent basis.

MRS. ROWLAND GETS \$10,000 DAMAGES FOR HER INJURIES

Wife of Former Eugene Minister Gets Settlement With Salem Bank.

Salem, Or., Aug. 7.—The \$100,000 damage suit of Clara H. Rowland, wife of Rev. B. F. Rowland, against the United States National Bank of this city was settled by compromise today, plaintiff getting \$10,000. She was tangled in the elevator shaft in the bank building a year ago. She was brought into court today in an invalid chair, being unable to stand since the accident. When the woman was hurt she was stepping from the elevator. The boy started too soon, catching her and dragging her between the elevator and the inner wall of the shaft.

GEO. L. BAKER MARRIED AT MEDFORD YESTERDAY

Mrs. Clara M. Galloway, widow of the late Attorney Robert Galloway, was married yesterday at Medford to George L. Baker, president of the Portland city council and head of the Baker theatrical enterprises. The wedding took place at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Skeel. The Rev. Weston F. Shields of Medford officiated. It marks the outcome of a pretty romance, and while close friends of both bride and bridegroom had for some time expected its outcome, the news of the wedding will come as a general surprise.—Oregonian.

Noted Writer Reaches Roseburg and Turns Toward South Again.

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 7.—Driving a prancing four-horse team, accompanied by Mrs. London and their Japanese camp boy, Jack London drove into the city late today after an eventful journey from Bandon and Marshfield. London had hardly registered at the hotel, when he was besieged by a large audience eager to learn of his wanderings.

In his apartments at the McClallen hotel tonight, London said he never felt better in his life, but he expressed regret that Mrs. London had contracted a severe attack of poison oak on their trip from California.

"We left the coast three days ago," said Mr. London, "and I assure you we have enjoyed every foot of the trip. We stopped here and there along the road and that we were treated like princes, would be putting it mildly."

"One farmer became enthusiastic over our coming that he offered to corral a deer that I might shoot it and show my California friends that I am not only a writer, but a hunter."

Oregon Scenery. "Talk about your natural scenery. I have visited many sections of the United States, but never has nature appealed to me as today. GREEK AND TRAIN COLLIDE HEAD-ON

Section Man Has Noyel Experience and Lives to Tell the Story.

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 8.—Demas Theodore, a Greek, and Southern Pacific section hand, is probably the only man who ever experienced a head-on collision with a railroad train and lived to marvel at his miraculous escape from death. While a velocipede northward from Dole, 20 miles south of this city, Theodore met the southbound Portland-Ashland passenger train, No. 19, coming at full speed. The terrific impact of the collision hurled the Greek 20 feet from the track, breaking one of his arms, bruising his body from head to foot, and rendering him insensible. He is now on the road to recovery at Mercy hospital in this city.

Theodore's velocipede was demolished by the train. He was squarely astride of it when the train struck it while rounding a curve. How he escaped being killed outright is more than he can figure out.

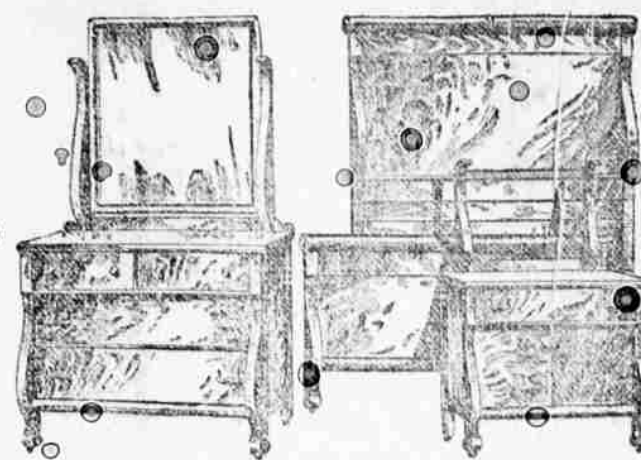
