CENTENNIAL AT ASTORIA

(Continued from page 1).
The formal opening of the centennial was preceded by a reception to distinguished visitors, and at noon an informal luncheon in honor of Governor West and other notables was given under a floral canopy of the roof of the principal hotel of the city.

Old Fort Astoria.
The swinging open of the gates of a replica of old Fort Astoria by Governor West was the signal to the waiting throng that the centennial was inaugurated. This event was preceded by a civic and military parade which, headed by the Centennial band, started from Government Square. Following the band were 1,000 "jacks" from the torpedo fleet, and the entire strength of the Oregon National guard, which is encamped near the city, who acted as a guard of honor for Governor West and his staff. Next in line came the Astoria centennial committee and prominent visiting state and municipal officials and the United Scandinavian Societies and other civic and fraternal organizations.

Arriving at the stockade around Fort Astoria the procession came to a halt and, after making a short address, Dr. H. L. Henderson, president of the Centennial committee, handed to Governor West a big iron key with which the governor opened the lock, and the wide gates of the stockade swung open. This was the signal to a solitary soldier standing, and he began a series of wig-wag signals to Fort Columbia and a roar from the big cannon at the fort was followed by similar demonstrations from the batteries at Fort Stevens and Fort Canby. Simultaneously the warships in the harbor took up the firing and a salvo of seventeen broadsides from the fleet added to the din which shook the city to its foundations.

Proceeding to the open air stadium Governor West and his staff and invited guests were greeted by a chorus of 1500 voices singing "America." This delightful feature concluded, the very Reverend Alexander Christie, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Oregon, returned thanks for the blessings that have been bestowed on the Oregon country in the century since the white man came. Following the invocation Governor West spoke at length on a "Century of Astoria and Oregon," dwelling on the accomplishments of the white man in the Oregon country and reviewing the wonderful transformation which has occurred since Astoria established his trading posts in this wilderness one hundred years ago.

Governor West was followed by several other speakers. At the conclusion of the speech-making, the entire gathering, led by the great chorus, brought the formal exercises of the day to an end by singing "The Star Spangled Banner."

Continue a Month.
The celebration will continue until September 3. The Centennial committee has arranged a long series of events, covering every day of the centennial period, for the entertainment of the visitors, including sporting events on land and water, artillery practice by the huge 14-inch disappearing guns at Forts Columbia, Canby and Stevens, land maneuvers and sham battles by the National guard, aeroplane flights on land and water, maneuvering of the warships in the harbor and numerous marine carnivals, historical parades and pyrotechnical displays.

August 23 has been designated as "Astoria Day." Special exercises and a floral parade on that day will precede the unveiling of a monument to John Jacob Astor.

Settled in 1811.
Astoria was settled in 1811 by an expedition financed by John Jacob Astor of New York. The expedition, unlike the expeditions sent into the far west and northwest by the two great English fur trading companies, the Northwest company and the Hudson Bay company, had as its co-ordinate purpose the colonization of the territory, not alone immediately surrounding the mouth of the Columbia river, but all the territory drained by the Columbia river and its tributaries. By a confusion of geographical facts, the Columbia and the Fraser river were presumed to be identical, hence the equally erroneous supposition that the Columbia drained the entire country from the California line north to a point 40 degrees north of the 54th parallel, north latitude and east to the summit of the Stoney (Rocky) mountains. In later years during the Oregon controversy, which gave rise to the slogan, "Fifty-four forty or fight," through the existence of both rivers has been ascertained, the United States, because they were in Astoria's time supposed to be identical, maintained its claim to the Fraser river country on the ground that Astor's colonization scheme included it as an part of the supposed Columbia river watershed.

Astor was unwise in the selection of his associates in the venture, for the four partners who headed the expedition were subjects of Great Britain. Using this as an excuse they sold out the post at Fort Astoria in 1813 to representatives of the Northwest company, who brought the news of the outbreak of the war between the United States and Great Britain in 1812.

Under British Rule.
Under the name of Fort George the fort established by Astor and known as Fort Astoria, remained under British rule for several years, until at the instigation of Astor, the United States, under a clause of the treaty of Ghent, in which both nations agreed to surrender all territory captured during the war of 1812, demanded the return of Fort Astoria.

England's representatives on the joint commission in London admitted the bona fide settlement of Astoria with the intent to colonize, and ceded sovereignty of the fort in 1818, but

insisted upon recognition of the validity of the sale of the real property by Astor's partners to the Northwest company. Astor was thus choused out of his property, but the United States had secured practical recognition of a powerful argument for use in the permanent settlement of the Oregon controversy in 1846.

In that controversy, Great Britain, as the result of exploration and alleged bona fide settlement of Fort Vancouver in 1821, claimed the territory as far south as the present Oregon-Washington boundary, the London commission having tentatively fixed the boundary line along the 49th parallel only so far west as the Rocky mountains.

Again the United States brought forth its argument that Astor's expedition intended, prior to 1821, to colonize the entire Columbia river watershed, and this argument, supported by the discovery of the Columbia in 1792 by Captain Gray and exploration by Lewis and Clark in 1805, secured the judgment of sovereignty to practically all the territory drained by the Columbia, save a considerable area in the Okanogan country.

The United States did not yield up the Fraser river watershed and the greater part of the Okanogan country gracefully. Polk, with many other eminent Americans, was convinced that our title was perfect as far north as 54 deg 40 min and he and the democratic party made their campaign in 1844 on the famous slogan, "Fifty-four forty or fight." The steps taken in line with this policy by congress all but involved us in war with Great Britain, who flatly refused to consider any proposal for a boundary further north than the 49th parallel. The breakdown of congress, which was followed within a few weeks by the convention with England establishing that parallel as the permanent boundary, was termed "a disgraceful surrender."

The territory secured to the United States, however, was a vast one, comprising all of the present states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and parts of Montana and Wyoming.

The principal historical structure in connection with the Astoria centennial celebration is a replica of the original Fort Astoria. This was a stockade enclosure, about 100 feet square, defended by four iron cannon. Within are reproductions of the log house in which Astor's expedition wintered in 1811-12, the "barn" in which the "pettries" were stored, the machine shop, the ammunition magazine and the store-house. The stockade is made of six-inch logs, ten feet high and are sharpened at the top with block houses at each of the four corners.
