WENDLING COMPANY. FILES TRUST DEED

Part of Siuslaw Timber Purchase Is in Douglas County.

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 11.—Evidence tending to indicate early construction by the Southern Pacific of the proposed road from Eugene to Marshfield materialized here late today, when the Wendling-Johnson Lumber company of San Francisco, filed a trust deed and mortgage with the county clerk, securing a bond issue of \$1,200,000.

The deed is executed in favor of the Michigan Trust Company, of Grand Rapids, and involves several thousand acres of timber lands in Douglas and Lane counties. Most of the land is said to be along the line of the proposed extension, and with the road completed and in operation, will be subject to easy transportation.

Local capitalists declare that Mr. Wendling is closely identified with the Southern Pacific Company and had knowledge of the plans at the company for the past 18 months and secured most of the valuable timber along the route prior to the announcement, and consequently at a low figure.

Roseburg people scout the story that the Southern Pacific Company was forced into constructing the road by Mr. Wendling, but say the announcement was made with a view of eliminating competition from Roseburg.

FRUIT DRYER WILL

HANDLE MUCH FRUIT

The Cottage Grove Fruit Drying and packing plant, which is now rapidly approaching completion, will draw business from a large territory, and cannot fail to prove a success from the outset. Mr. Rust has already contracted for seventy-five tons of prunes to be shipped from Eugene, and he feels confident that an equal amount of the fruit will come from this territory, which, with the many other fruits that are promised, will make a very creditable showing for the first season. It is the intention of Mr. Rust to process apples, peaches and other fruits this season and later to handle cherries and berries, large crops of which may be grown here on small acreage. The prune drying season lasts but about six weeks, and hence the plan to handle other crops for the present, and probably machinery will be installed before next fall for operating a complete cannery.—Sentinel.
