COL. YORAN TELLS HOW FORT STEVENS STOOD THE ATTACK

By Carefully Planning and Dexterity of Eugene Soldiers, Assault Was Foiled.

The following is a fuller and more exact explanation of the "battle" at Fort Stevens where the Eugene soldiers "gallantly" defended the fort, and which they did not allow to fall into the hands of the attacking Third regiment, as the Oregonian stated.

"Colonel Yoran, in whose charge the defense of the fort was placed, when interviewed at his home in Eugene last evening said:

"Fort Stevens was never captured, except by the newspaper reporter, and the umpire's decision has not been given to that effect. Our line was chosen early in the morning on the place which I chose as the easiest to defend, and which has been confirmed as the best by our umpire; we got our men on that line before the enemy reached it, although they had an hour the start of us, and we held it uninterrupted, with the exception of one company who was allowed to enter the fort after they were captured. I gave orders that they be allowed to pass the first line and they were captured by the second. Even if they had got past this line there was still a third; when the fight was called off I had two companies in reserve one of which was Company C, of Eugene.

What is more, I dropped shrapnel (imaginary) shot from my mortars into the main body of their troops before they were two miles from us. I had them located by telephone at a certain crossroads at a certain moment, and with the accuracy of my guns, I could have destroyed the greater portion of their army before they reached us.

"The umpires have not decided that the fort was captured or could have been captured. This is not their duty, and was done only by the newspaper reporter who happened to be with the 'enemy' and was not inside my fort.

"My point was gained when I established my line. It was a race to see whether I could build a line that would defend the fort before they reached there to interrupt me. I got every man in place long before they came, although they had an hour the start of us, because we had to wait the length of time I would take us to come down from Portland. Then my battle was partly won. They were supposed to have come from some place outside the range of the fort—down by Tillamook somewhere where they had landed.

"But even before they reached my line, who saw them first, my men were emptying blank shells into their ranks."
