RAILROAD RUMORS FROM MARSHFIELD

None of Current Reports Are Confirmed on the Bay.

Several new railroad stories are afloat in Marshfield today and it is claimed that they are prey well substantiated, and tend to confirm the stories printed in the Times a few days ago about contractors figuring on starting construction here soon.

One story is that a certain contractor has been here getting estimates on railroad construction material and that another has been securing terms from some of the steamers plying in here on hauling an entire construction outfit to Coos Bay from San Francisco. It is further declared that the contractors are not Southern Pacific contractors and that they are figuring on starting work this fall.

No public statement has been made by the Coos Bay and Eastern Electric people nor by the Coos Bay and Boise that would shed any light on the above rumors.

One Coos Bay man who has been looking into the matter stated today that he was positive that a steam line and an electric line will be built directly east from Coos Bay in addition to the Southern Pacific line to Eugene.

Nothing further has been heard from J. P. O'Brien as to the date on which he may visit Coos Bay—Marshfield Times.

W. E. Boie, a railroad contractor of Spokane, left for his home yesterday after a several days stay on the Bay. He insisted that his visit here now was purely on personal matters and had no railroad significance, but many think that it had

COSTLY FIRE AT THE DALLES SATURDAY
 The Dalles, Or., Aug. 19.—Fire, which started in the sleeping quarters over the California restaurant at 5 o'clock this morning, destroyed the contents of five business houses on West Second street the main thoroughfare of the city. All the structures damaged by the blaze were shacks which will be replaced by modern brick buildings. The total loss is estimated at \$11,550. The business concerns put out of business temporarily are the California restaurant and lodging house; Lemke & Sons, saloon; W. E. Mills, real estate; A. G. Hooring, confectionery; Milne Bros. meat market. Mrs. Mathilda Baldwin, of Portland, owned four of the five buildings destroyed. Practically all of the property which went up in smoke was covered by insurance.

 Notice is hereby given that the State Land Board of the State of Oregon will sell to the highest bidder at its office in the Capital Building, at Salem, Oregon, on October 24, 1911, at 10:00 o'clock a. m., of said day, all the State's interest in the tide and overflow lands hereinafter described, giving, however to the owner or owners of any land abutting or fronting on such tide and overflow lands the preference right to purchase said tide and overflow lands at the highest price offered, provided such offer is made in good faith, and also providing that the land will not be sold for, nor any offer therefor accepted of less than \$7.50 per acre, the board reserving the right to reject any and all bids. Said lands are situated in Lane county, Oregon, and described as follows:

Beginning at a point, the meander corner on the south line of sec. 21, T. 18 S. R. 12 W. at the SE corner of lot 4 of sec. 21, determined by running east 4.34 chains from a point 80 chains north of a point on north line of sec. 33 as fixed by running due west from 1/4 section corner on north line of sec. 34 and said point on north line of sec. 33 being 20 chains west of line due north from SE corner of sec. 33—thence var. 20 degrees 45 minutes.

Beginning at the SE corner of sec. 33 north 1.00 chain enter open sand hills. 77.26 chain interest north line of sec. 34 extended W from 1/4 sec. corner of north side of sec. 34, west 20.00 chains, north 56.00 chains to one sixteenth corner between secs. 28 and 21, east 4.34 chain to M. C. between secs. 28 and 21 following United States Government Survey notes, N 21 degrees, E 6.80 chain to line of low tide. By inspection I find from this point low tide line runs west from government survey meander line to point 9.52 chains S 36 degrees E from M C between secs. 16 and 21.

Beginning at M C between secs. 21 and 28, east 1.40 chains to line of low tide, N 8 degrees, 43 minutes E 6.42 chains along line of low tide to point of low tide on United States meander line which point is N 21 degrees E 6.8 chains from M C between secs. 21 and 28.

Beginning at one sixteenth corner between secs. 28 and 21 which corner is 4.34 chains west of M. C. north 80 chains east, 11.75 chains to M. C. between secs. 21 and 16, S 36 degrees E 9.52 chains on United States Government meander line to line of low tide.

Beginning at M C between secs. 21 and 16, east 5.90 chains to line of low tide, S 86 degrees 16 minutes W 7.63 chains along line of low tide to point on United States meander line, said point being S 36 degrees E 9.52 chains from M C between secs. 21 and 16.

Beginning at M C between secs. 21 and 16, N 29 degrees and 30 minutes W 12.74 chains on course given in the U. S. Survey notes for meander line of sec. 16. This line was run for the purpose of further establishing the meander corner between secs. 16 and 21.

The old Ferry landing opposite Duncan's cannery mentioned in United States field notes as being at this point. This point is between shore and piling used for old landing. The west piling bears N 52 degrees, 30 minutes E 79 links distant, containing 2.71 acres of tide land fronting and abutting on lots 1, 2, 3, and 4 of sec. 21, T 15 S R. 12 W of W. M.
