TREES ABOUT POST OFFICE DYING

Moisture and Air Are Shut Out From Roots by Pavements—Effort to Save Them.

The Eugene postoffice corner, one of the prettiest in the city, will soon be robbed of its beautiful trees unless something is done at once. Already one has died and has been cut down. Another is dying and may be too far gone to be saved, and the other three have turned brown at the top.

According to the opinions of C. R. Sutz and Frank H. Kellogg, of the Cascade forest reserve, whose offices are in the postoffice building, the cause of the death of the trees is that their roots are covered on one side by a 16-foot concrete walk, and a bit of the street on the other side. Through this they can get neither water nor air, both of which are essential to the growth of a tree. The air is carried into the ground by the pavement. Another cause is that the pavement absorbs a certain intense heat from the sun during the day, and this is not only harmful to the roots but it bakes and dries the ground. There has been left about the trunk of each tree a small opening and water has been poured in there but it is the opinion of the forest experts that no sufficient quantity of water could be placed there that would reach the ends of the roots where the moisture and the air it contains are needed.

According to these experts there is but one way of saving the trees. Several four-inch perforated pipes could be driven to a depth of six feet or so in places about each tree at a distance of several feet from the trunk. If filled with water once or twice a day this might keep the beautiful trees alive. Or a system of perforated filling could be laid under the walk and paving through which water could be run. One of these plans must be followed or the trees will have to be cut down for dead timber within four months.
