### UNIVERSITY SUIT TO BE HEARD SOON

Decision in Circuit Court Expected Early Next Month.

Salem, Or., Aug. 22.—Secretary of State Olcott will have 10 days in which to file his answer to the injunction suit brought against him to prevent his placing the university referendum on the ballots for the next general election. After the state's answer the university will have until the second Monday in October in which to reply but it is thought the university attorneys, W. T. Slater, M. E. Pogue and W. M. Kaiser, will file their reply sooner.

Judge Galloway will be here before the state fair opens and as soon as he arrives it is thought the attorneys for the university will ask that the case be set down for early hearing. The state also will want to expedite matters, according to Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle. The hearing will be before Judge Galloway.

Either side will have the right to appeal the case to the supreme court and unless an unusually conclusive fight is put up by one side and a "fall down" registered by the other the case will go to the supreme court. As neither of these things are expected to occur but rather a close fight is expected, it is anticipated that the case will be passed upon by the supreme court. The case could hang fire in the courts over 12 months and yet be decided in time to place the referendum on the ballot but Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle thinks the case will be finally decided before January 1, the date on which the money appropriated for the university becomes available under the bills.

Secretary Olcott is placed in a peculiar position by the filing of the suit, which is directed at him. By virtue of his office of secretary of state he is also a member of the board of regents of the university. At a recent meeting of the board he suggested that the members of that board start a subscription to assist in paying the attorneys' fees for the fight against the referendum, and he is an avowed supporter of the university.

At the same time he is made the sole defendant in the two suits which have been filed here. Among the allegations is one that Olcott, as secretary, did not examine the names to determine whether they were fraudulent. "Such an allegation is somewhat misleading," he said today. "I considered that I merely acted in a ministerial capacity, and that it was not my duty to determine whether such names were forged. In fact, it is a manifest absurdity for anyone to believe that I could or should do so, when it is remembered that for many weeks at a time several detectives and handwriting experts were busy

examining the petitions to secure evidence. "Perhaps such an allegation is an essential part of the complaint, but it places me in a bad light, as though to a certain extent I were trying to abet the referendum, when, as a matter of fact, my position as set out by the law, is merely to take such petitions and file them. Obviously, I have nothing else to do."

### REED INSTITUTE HAS FIFTY STUDENTS

With nearly 50 students registered for the freshman class, the new Reed college will begin its career under very auspicious circumstances. It is true that the new buildings will not be ready by the opening day, September 13, but temporary quarters have been secured at Eleventh and Jefferson streets, which will be occupied until the buildings are in readiness. Of the 46 students that have qualified for the opening class, 18 are from the Washington High school, 8 are from the Lincoln High school, and 7 are from the Portland academy.—Journal.

### MUTTONHEAD CLUB FOR HOP RAISERS WHO CONTRACTED FOR 15

Hillsboro, Or., Aug. 19.—A contract for 1911 hops was filed today by which A. J. Ray & Son take the crop of J. S. Myers at 15 cents. The contract was made March 24. Eleven similar contracts filed during the present year are on file in the recorder's office, the price ranging from 11 to 15 cents, with the majority at the latter figure. There are other contracts for 1911 crops made in previous years, and the contracts include the big Witch Hazel and Sinclair yards. Still there are many growers not tied up and they reap a harvest from the high prices. As usual, reports of the condition of the yards vary, but taken as a whole, it is probably an average year.

### CITY VIEW HOUSE DESTROYED BY FIRE

Was Not Yet Finished and Origin of Fire Is Mystery. Fire destroyed a new story and a half five-room bungalow in City-View Park in the southwestern part of the city Saturday night. The fire started from unknown cause about 9:30 and was too far out to be reached by the city department. The building was new, finished about a month ago, although the owners, A. N. Trawick and J. W. Coleman, had arranged to have some more painting and papering done and had a lot of paint there for use. The building had not as yet been occupied, and no fire had even been started in it, and no one had been on the premises for several days to the knowledge of the owners. The cost of the house was between \$900 and \$1,000. Insurance for \$500 had been placed with the Farmers' Mutual Fire Relief association and a vacancy permit applied for, though not yet received at the time of the fire. Mr. Trawick did not learn of the fire until Sunday, and his wife then recalled having seen the fire off in that direction, but thought it was a brush fire.
