TWENTY-FIVE KILLED

IN FRANTIC RUSH

Explosion of Motion Picture Film Results in Wild Panic in Pittsburgh Theatre.

Pittsburg, Aug. 26.—Twenty-five persons are known to be dead and a large number injured, following an explosion of a moving picture film in the Morgan and Grant opera house at Cannonsburg, Pa., 20 miles from here tonight.

As the film exploded some one cried "fire." The house was crowded with women and children. All rushed to the hall leading to the balcony and were hemmed in on the stairs. Few thought to use the fire escapes. Many were knocked down and trampled upon. Most of the dead were smothered in the mass of persons who fought for egress to the street.

A Writting Mass. A writhing, screaming mass of humanity ten feet high was jammed in the narrow stairway leading to the entrance to the theater. When the volunteer fire department arrived those of the audience who had escaped from the building and other persons drawn to the scene were pushing about ineffectively. No one was making an effort to aid the struggling mass within the theater.

Firemen pushed into the building and threw many into the street. As the ejected ones regained their feet, they ran about shrieking in terror. When the firemen got nearer the bottom of the pile they found the injured and later came to the dead. Within a few minutes after the film flashed the fire whistles were blown. The entire population responded and packed the narrow street into which the fatal theater opens. All apparently were terror-stricken and gave little aid. Many of the dead were unidentified.

Fights the Flames. John McCullough, operator of the moving picture machine, fought the flames in his asbestos cabinet when the film flashed. For several moments the audience, about 1500, was not aware of the accident as the operator heroically extinguished the fire. Then the scorched and suffocating McCullough opened the door of the cabinet and the smoke poured out. The cry of fire was raised and children ran into persons waiting admission. Instantly the stairway was packed by the frantic persons. One woman threw her infant from a window fifty feet from the ground. J. W. Reese caught the child in his arms, unharmed, but as yet it has not yet been claimed by the mother.

Entrance to the theater is through a narrow vestibule and up a narrow stairway of fifty steps leading directly into the theater, which is owned by J. P. Morgan of Cannonsburg. Miss Mary Craig, the pianist, began playing a slow march when the panic began. She played the selection over and over, "Swing" "Faltering." Many caught the swing of the music and tried to hold back the crowd. When the audience had left the building Miss Craig departed, uninjured.

MAJORY MAHR TAKES HER LOSS LIGHTLY

Her Apartment House Burned—Says "It'll Turn Out All Right."

"Oh, it'll turn out all right," is the cheery way Miss Marjorie Mahr takes the burning of the Mahr apartments, her sole support, which were partially destroyed Saturday night, says the Oregonian.

The damage to the building, owned by M. Barde & Sons, is \$25,000, and the damage to the furnishings, owned by Miss Mahr, more than \$8,000, partially covered by insurance.

The second prank of fate in the course of 18 months to put Miss Mahr face to face with poverty, she takes with the same hopefulness as the loss of both legs in a railroad accident over a year ago, which ended her stage career.

"I don't know exactly what I shall do now. I am a bit unnerved as yet, and I have not got everything straightened up, but I know it will all turn out for the best," said Miss Mahr last night. "I am not entirely destitute. Two such reverses in 18 months are pretty hard, but I will weather through with the help of my friends."

The Mahr apartments caught fire about 11 o'clock Saturday night. It is supposed from defective wiring—and the second and third floors of the building were burned and gutted. About 100 tenants were driven into the streets. No lives were lost, although several had narrow escapes.

PRESIDENT OPENS

FIGHT FOR RE-ELECTION

Hamilton, Mass., Aug. 27.—President Taft began the presidential campaign of 1912 in a speech that breathed defiance and condemned the work of the insurgent Republicans and Democrats combined to revise the several schedules of present traffic at the special session of congress just closed.

The president singled out Senator La Follette, Speaker Champ Clark and Chairman Underwood of the house ways and means committee, as leaders of the revision and charged them with playing politics. He indicated that he regarded the proposed revisions as injurious and dangerous to business, but made it plain that if the tariff board in December reported in favor of a downward revision of cotton and wool schedules he would recommend a reduction.

Standing on the terrace of Congressman Gardner's farm with Senator Lodge and other Massachusetts Republican leaders, the president seemed to scent the smoke of the coming battle. He said in part: "I am here to speak words of encouragement as to the outlook for Republican success."

Important to Massachusetts. "You have a state election immediately before you into which seems to me natural issues ought to enter."

He said the extra session of congress had considered matters of such importance to Massachusetts that he could not see how the people of that state could refrain from the expression of their opinion. He declared the extra session was called to confirm Canadian reciprocity, which it did by the support of both parties.
