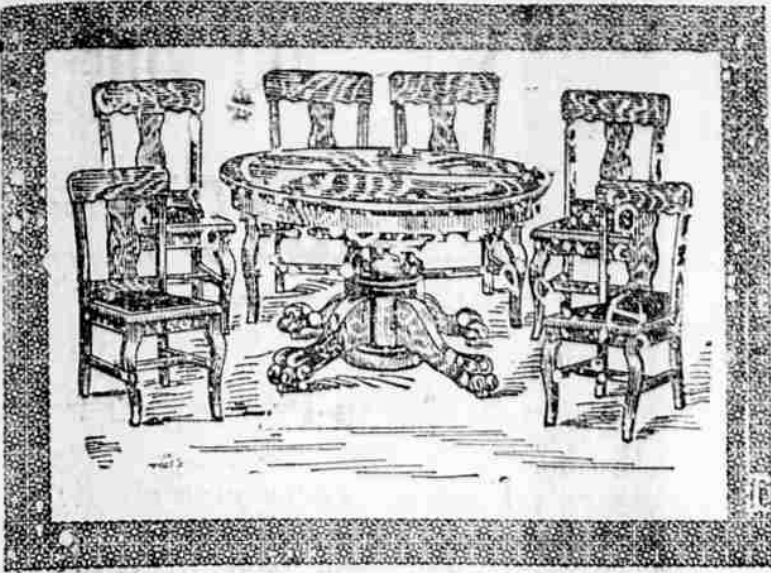

SALMON CANNING HAS BEGUN AT FLORENCE

Kyle & Sons Begin With Season's Run—Other Lower Siuslaw News.

Canning salmon was commenced at Kyle & Sons cannery last Monday, only a few cases being put up. The crew of Chinese have not arrived yet and probably will not come before next week.

The company has added a new machine to their plant, which does away with soldering the cans. Instead of fastening the heads on with solder, they are sealed up by crimping the heads firmly about the edge, which holds them securely and keeps out the air.

After being sealed up the contents are cooked without opening a vent in the can, as done under the old method. There will not be so much work at handling the cans so a smaller number of men will be required to operate the cannery.

School Principal.
A telegram was received by D. E. Severy, district clerk, from Prof. Alfred Powers, accepting the position of principal of Florence school, which he was recently elected by the board of directors. Prof. Powers was principal of the high school at Pleasant Hill last year and is highly recommended as a teacher. At present he is at Purcell, Oklahoma. The school opens September 18.

The labor liens which had been filed against the lumber at the Oregon & California Lumber Co's. mill were paid off Tuesday morning. The schooner Oakland began taking on lumber at the wharf Monday morning, and considerable interest was aroused as to the effect this would have on the liens. A message was sent to Eugene to inform the attorneys for the claimant of the matter, but before anything further was done the local bank received a message by wire from San Francisco stating that funds to satisfy the claims had been deposited in a bank in that city.

Brief News Notes.
M. D. Johnson returned home Sunday from a ten days' absence at Eugene where he went on business connected with the big timber land deal recently pulled off by him and Jesse Bounds. While at the county seat Mr. Johnson purchased the Swiss home ranch a few miles above Mapleton.

Geo. Melvin Miller, F. E. Adams, Mr. Moon and Mr. Clark of Eugene, arrived here Wednesday enroute to Hecla to take some views in that section. On their return they will take views of Glenada and Tallicoon Lake as well as a panoramic view of Florence.

We are informed that a deal is on foot for Mrs. Kennedy's tide land above town and the title will be transferred at once. She left the land in charge of an agent here who negotiated the sale, and the money has been deposited in the bank to take up the deed as soon as it is delivered. The tract embraces about 50 acres and the consideration is said to be \$3,000.

Prof. H. B. Leonard of the U. of O., J. W. Zimmerman, Dr. Campbell and a number of other Eugene people arrived at Florence Wednesday, having come in to Mapleton with automobiles.

The steamer Tillamook arrived Saturday morning from Portland. The vessel made only a short stay so on her way down the coast.

The schooner Oakland was towed out to sea Tuesday evening and spread her masts for a voyage to San Francisco. The vessel took on most of her cargo at the Siuslaw Lumber Co's. mill, then finished loading at the Florence mill.

Percy Patterson, Cecil Henderson, Ray Babb and Claude Adkins are a party of Eugene boys who came in the first of the week with an automobile and spend a few days hunting and fishing at Tallicoon Lake.

A deer was killed on the sand hill just below Glenada and close to the river yesterday morning by Willie Sanborn. It proved to be a tame deer belonging to George Colter's family.

O. L. Brewster of Tallicoon Lake is about to lease his ranch to Mr. Balgiger of North Bend for a term of five years. Mr. Brewster will remain on the ranch till next spring.

The Wilhelmia arrived here Tuesday from Yaquina with several tons of freight on board. The vessel left again the same evening.

The contract for building Captain John Bergman's home in Florence, was awarded to L. Stronen of North Bend. The new residence will be a fine one and will be nicely located with a good view of the Siuslaw—Florence West.

WORK ASSURED

War Department Has Approved Surety Bond of Bond Buyers.

Florence, Or., Aug. 28.—A message has been received here by I. B. Cushman, president of the port of Siuslaw, to the effect that the surety bonds of the Dime Savings bank have been approved by the war department. The bank purchased the bonds issued by the port for the construction of the harbor improvement, and now that they have been approved bids will be advertised for at once and a contract for the work, which is expected to be resumed this fall. There is now 15 feet of water on the bar.

NEW RAILROAD LINE PROJECTED TO BAY

Engineer Aston Arrives In Marshfield To Begin Work.

Taggart Aston, chief engineer of the Coos Bay & Eastern Electric railway company arrived here today from San Francisco, says the Marshfield Times. He was accompanied by some engineers and announced this afternoon that he would start in next Monday with three surveying parties on the final survey of the route from Marshfield to Roseburg. Mr. Aston has made preliminary surveys of the route and the present one will be the locating survey.

W. A. Cattell, vice-president and general manager of the company, is expected here shortly to join Messrs. Nevers and Aston. Mr. Cattell is one of the best known railroad men and consulting engineers on the coast.

Mr. Aston announced today that contrary to general reports, he did not propose to infringe in any way on the survey for the Coos Bay and Bolse, made by F. A. Haines heretofore. He said that he was confident that another route just as good as Mr. Haines' could be secured and that it was not his intention or the intention of his company to interfere in any way with the project.

Additional members of his surveying party will arrive via Bandon on the Fifield and others will come in on the next Redondo.

OREGON ELECTRIC CO. PROGRESSES STEADILY

That some people do not wish to "hold up" the Oregon Electric is made evident by the fact that many of the stretches of right of way from Salem have been absolutely free and with no strings attached, says the Salem Statesman.

The latest of these progressives is Dr. Angie Ford-Warren of Portland, a sister of the late Tilmou Ford, who owns a 670-acre ranch on the Ankeny Bottom near Sidney. She gave the right of way through her farm unconditionally and said she was glad to do so.

The fact that the Oregon Electric company has again sent the big red automobile to Salem would seem to indicate that there may be something doing in the construction line before very long. Several of the condemnation cases that were delayed by the attorneys for the land owners through technicalities, will come up for trial at the next term of court, which opens September 18.

The season's crops will soon be harvested, too, so the labor market will be easier and men and teams more easily available. The actual work of constructing the line to Eugene will then be commenced, it is thought.
