AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION MEETS

Boston, Aug. 29.—The thirty-fourth annual session of the American bar association began here today. The executive committee of the general council met during the day and this afternoon the annual gathering of comparative law bureau was held.

PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, the Common Council of the City of Eugene by a resolution duly passed and approved, submitted to the electors of said city at the regular annual election which was held April 3, 1911, an amendment to the city charter of said city, known as Section 138, authorizing the common council to issue negotiable bonds of the City of Eugene in the amount of Twenty-five Thousand (\$25,000) Dollars for the purpose of installing and equipping a Series Tungsten Electrical Lighting System for said city, and

Whereas, at said election 972 votes were cast in favor of said amendment and 418 against the same, said amendment carrying by a majority of 554.

Now therefore, I, F. J. Berger, Mayor of the City of Eugene do hereby proclaim and declare that the said section 138 is in full force and effect as a part of the Charter of the City of Eugene.

CLARK-HENERY CO GETS PAVING CONTRACT

Eight Blocks of Streets Will Be Paved This Fall—Council Routine.

A short meeting of the city council last night, at which time the unfinished business of last week was taken up, was held. Contracts for eight blocks of hard surface pavement were let to the Clark-Henery company, and the issue of \$57,000 light, power and water bonds were given to J. H. Cansey & Co. of Denver. This firm offered a premium of \$230 with the interest on the bonds at 5 per cent. This is 1-2 per cent lower than any of the other bids, and a certified check, which was not submitted last week, has been furnished.

The Clark-Henery company offers to pave the streets at \$1.80 a square yard, but the council has reserved the right to enter into separate contracts for the curbing. The remonstrances against pavement on East Ninth street were denied, with the understanding that the pavement would not be laid until the sewer is laid. Hilyard street was not in owners desired pavement. There were no remonstrances against the paving of Tenth street from Willamette to Pearl; Ninth from Pearl to High, and Patterson from Mill to Ninth. Chairman Bell explained that the sewer mains on East Ninth street will be laid inside the parking, and that the connections can be made across the street before the pavement is laid. Hilyard street was not included in the contract. The paving company has agreed to take the Bancroft bonds and the property owners will be given 10 years to pay for the work.

Routine Work. A petition for a sidewalk on the north side of Fairmount boulevard from Moss avenue to Orchard avenue was referred to the street committee. A petition for a sidewalk on the east side of Van Buren street from Eleventh to Thirteenth street, was referred to the street committee.

R. S. Smith presented an ordinance for a franchise for the Portland, Eugene & Eastern on West Eleventh street from the present terminus to the city limits. The franchise was granted.

An ordinance was introduced to provide for the sale of \$25,000 of electric light bonds recently rejected by the buyers on a technicality.

Chairman Bell of the sewer committee, recommended that the street commissioner and sewer inspector raise some low manholes, clean inlets and couple up flush tanks. Mr. Bell also reported a number of cases of property owners who had failed to connect with sewers.

City Engineer Waggoner presented a preliminary estimate for a sewer from Fifteenth street and south and east past Sixteenth and Oak streets. Sewer granted.

An ordinance read once previously, to govern laying of cement sidewalks, was referred to the street committee.

STEAM SHOVELS FOR OREGON EASTERN

Vale, Or., Aug. 27.—The arrival of a steam shovel in the Vale railroad yards is the strongest proof yet to substantiate rumors that the Oregon-Eastern out of this city would be constructed this fall. Railroad men have repeatedly said the line into the interior would be undertaken this year and most likely before September 1.

As another steam shovel is being held in the Ontario railroad yards, it is believed the Harriman people are rounding up necessary material for the big job. A number of right of way men of the Harriman system have been digging away at the records in the local courthouse while others are said to be working quietly in the field securing the needed strip of land for the roadbed.

The Oregon Eastern intersects the Natron extension, from Eugene, Or., to Weed, Cal., in the vicinity of Waldo Lake. When it is built and the Eugene-Coos Bay line is in operation it will give the Harriman system a transcontinental line with the terminus at Coos Bay. The way was paved for the construction of this line when the Hill people surrendered their rights in Malheur canyon to the Harriman lines nearly a year ago.
