SEAVEY HOP YARD WILL USE 700 PICKERS

Hops Will Yield Splendidly This Year—Picking Begins Soon After Sept. 1.

Hop picking in the yards of Lane county is beginning generally this week, and by the first of September and for three or four weeks thereafter, 3000 or 4000 pickers will be employed. In one yard alone, that of the Seavey brothers on the McKenzie, five miles from Eugene, 700 pickers will be employed. This is the largest yard in the county, or in fact the entire upper Willamette valley. The crop is very heavy this year, and will average over 2,000 pounds to the acre in the Seavey yard. The yield appears to be "spotted," that is, light in places and heavy in others. But where the yield is heavy it is heavier probably than any previous year. The price to be received by the hops this year has exceeded 40 cents and local contracts have been made from that figure down to 20 cents.

The quality of the hops all over the county is exceedingly good and practically every yard is free from all vermin. There is said to be scarcely any lice in the county. The red spider threatened early in the season but prompt action by the growers exterminated it. The blossoms are large and heavy and the picking will be exceptionally good. The pickers will be paid the customary price of 50 a box in the majority of the yards in this vicinity.

Early Picking This Week. The early hop picking began this week. Jesse Seavey in his yard three miles from Springfield, on the Willamette river, began yesterday and Clark & Washburne will use Seavey's crew of pickers, which will finish the last of the week. Jesse Easton has been picking in his yard east of Springfield for the past week. The early hops will not run much over 1,000 pounds to the acre.

The hop picking season is looked forward to by the pickers as not only a chance to make money, but also as a great picnic. The young people, especially of all classes, mix freely in the yards and the hop-picking season is actually an outing. At Seavey Brothers' yard, where 700 pickers will congregate, is a dance hall, and other places of entertainment, and after working hours there is ample opportunity for recreation.

Hop Picking Social Leveler. Hop picking is a great social leveler, and persons of every type work and joke side by side in the yards. The pickers can earn from \$2.50 to \$3.50 a day by the work. With the crop as heavy as it is, and with the price well up, the revenues received from Lane county's hop yield will be exceedingly beneficial to the industrial welfare of the community.

CLUB WANTS BATTLESHIP OREGON TO LEAD WORLD NAVIES THROUGH CANAL

Resolutions Adopted Last Night By Commercial Body to That Effect.

The Commercial club, at its regular business session last night, adopted a resolution asking that the famous old battleship Oregon, which did such valiant service in the war with Spain, be allowed to lead the vessels of the navies of the world through the Panama canal, after its completion. The resolution is worded as follows:

"Whereas, it is the plan of the United States government to invite the nations of the world to join the American fleet on its passage through the Panama canal on its official opening in 1915 and proceed to San Francisco to participate in the opening of the Panama-Pacific International exposition;

"Whereas, the Battleship Oregon, which was built at the Union Iron works, San Francisco, by the brave and sinew of our patriotic working men and christened Oregon in honor of this great state and subsequently given the title of the 'bulldog of the navy,' by reason of the wonderful achievement of steaming 14,000 miles from ocean to ocean, and arriving in the waters off Santiago in time to participate in the historic fight that ended our troubles with Spain; and

"Whereas, the attention of the whole world was centered on the remarkable voyage of the Oregon, and emphasized the necessity of constructing the Panama canal;

"Therefore, be it resolved that the Eugene Commercial club, join with the Panama-Pacific International exposition delegation now present and pledge themselves to use the utmost endeavor to prevail upon the federal government to do fitting honor to the battleship Oregon by naming her as the ship of war to lead the navies of the world through the Panama canal, and further be it

"Resolved, that we pledge ourselves to call upon our delegation in congress to use every effort to bring about the fulfillment of the desire of the people of the states of Oregon and California.

Other Matters. D. C. Freeman, D. E. Yoran and O. E. Roberts were named as a committee to arrange for the entertainment of the state letter carriers when they meet in Eugene soon.

The president of the club was authorized to appoint a committee to provide entertainment for Congressman W. C. Hawley, when he visits Eugene Monday to address the carriers.

The club voted to donate the sum of \$50 to make up the deficiency in the fund used to entertain the Pacific Indians at their annual shoot held recently in this city.

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

GETS VALUABLE FARM

Medford, Or., Aug. 28.—An agricultural experiment station in the Rogue River valley has been assured by the order of Colonel Frank Ray of New York, to give the Oregon Agricultural college all the land, water and electricity for light and power that it wants on his large estate near Toledo. The college will accept.

The station will determine soil and crop conditions and co-operate with the farmer in planting the right crops on the right land. Considerable attention will be paid to fighting insect pests and plant diseases.

The station in fact, will be the clearing house for information on agricultural and horticultural subjects.

The Condon Times points to Pat Farley, a Gilliam county rancher, as an example of what may be done in that county. Pat arrived from Ireland 11 years ago with \$10, more or less, and has by his own efforts made himself worth \$20,000 in land and livestock.
