RAILWAY NORTH OF

KLAMATH FALLS

35 Miles of New Southern Pacific Line Will Be Opened Soon.

Klamath Falls, Or., Sept. 13.—Within the next two months Erickson & Peterson, the contractors building the Southern Pacific road north of this city, will have their contract completed. This will make the line ready for operation to a point 35 miles from Klamath Falls. The operations by Erickson & Peterson are in heavy rock, but the next portion of the road is across the Klamath marsh and will be easy of construction. The contract for this has not been let, and it is likely that no further work will be done until next year, as the work across the marsh cannot be carried on through the winter.

Nothing new can be learned in connection with the road to Merrill. Work should begin by the middle of this month, but so far no steps have been taken to start construction. Several of the contracts for right of way in the vicinity of Merrill provide that actual construction must be under way by September 15. In the event it is not so begun the company loses the right of way. One thing that would indicate that the work is not to be done at once is the fact that the Southern Pacific company has not purchased any hay between this city and Merrill. Construction Engineer H. P. Hoey, who has charge of the Klamath Falls-Natron cut-off says that he has no orders for any work after the Erickson & Peterson contract and the unfinished contract on the Natron end are completed.

HOPE FOR RAILROAD

H. G. Page, Waltherville Citizen, Says That Part of County Would Welcome Cars.

The establishment of a shipping station at Waltherville would enable the farmers in that country to turn their attention to the raising of small fruit, for which the soil and climate are peculiarly fitted. He cites as proof the fact that he has had red raspberries since June and that the bushes are still bearing abundantly. Owing to the distance from a shipping point, however, they can not be raised profitably for commercial purposes. CLARK'S DEATH WILL DELAY RAILROAD

Roseburg, Or., Sept. 12.—Local capitalists interested in the promotion of the Coos-Bay and Oregon Central railroad consider the death of Francis H. Clark, its promoter, a severe blow to the project. Mr. Clark passed much of his time in Roseburg the past year and is said to have had the plans of his enterprise about completed when he was stricken.

Besides the surveys, Mr. Clark had secured the right of ways between Roseburg and Marshfield subject to the consent of his company. Roseburg people interested in the project are anxious that another man can be secured and the plan of Mr. Clark carried out.

It is admitted here, however, that his death will result in delay.
