FUN AHEAD FOR THE VOTERS.

Councilman S. P. Ness is a good citizen and is no doubt serving his constituents honestly and to the best of his ability. Of course, it is not possible in the affairs of this life to please everybody, especially if one is a city councilman, and in this instance those who are not in accord with Mr. Ness' views upon some matters pertaining to municipal administration are proceeding to invoke the recall. Later on, it is understood, other members of the council and the mayor will be treated in a similar manner.

Thus we are assured of a practically continuous election campaign for an indefinite time, since once the recall is invoked there is no known remedy for the disease. Seattle recalled Mayor Gill and several councilmen and as soon as the legal time limit expired the new executive, Dilling, and the councilmen elected with him were subjected to the same ordeal. Tacoma is passing through the same experience.

Since Eugene's mayor and councilmen are to be recalled one at a time, we may look forward to an election every week or two in the future. There is to be no dull monotony in our political affairs and if business conflicts with the strenuous work of continuous campaigning—well we can let business go to the bow wows. The recall has been made part of our unique and interesting system of government, and it will encourage Mr. U'Ren to further efforts in behalf of the oppressed masses if we get busy and use it upon every possible occasion. The fellow who is not willing to accept the will of the majority, the kicker and the sorehead, has been given his inning by the Oregon City statesman.

That Eugene is to be the terminal of Hill's Oregon Electric railway, and that branch lines will radiate from this city, was indicated in President Gray's address at Albany's banquet Monday night, when he said: "We hope to become intimately a part of your life and you of ours. An electric road can be made more intimate commercially and socially than any other, with its greater convenience bringing localities closer together, and having better facilities. Mr. Hill appreciates Oregon. I know the United States pretty well but know of no scope of country equal to the Willamette valley. The Oregon Electric now has no hope beyond the valley. This present line is to be the back bone of a system, through which the traffic will pass with feeders reaching out. The project has been to go as straight as possible regardless of localities, building a high grade, first-class road in every particular. Now we have nothing in view beyond Eugene, but feeders are in view. My plan has been not to announce before hand what we are going to do, but afterwards tell what we have done, building as quickly as possible, and then giving a good service, and be on good terms with Albany people if you will let us."

The Salem Capital Journal says: "Governor West is right in drawing the line on a lot of bills run by the naval militia. As soon as a new graft is started on the people, the officials who get the plums begin finding how much can be got out of it in the way of 'necessaries.' The average concept of plucking money out of the state has neither personal pride nor public spirit back of it."

Charles E. Hughes is talked of as the progressive republican candidate for president. The associate justice is progressive all right—he indicated that when he shaved off those flowing whiskers.

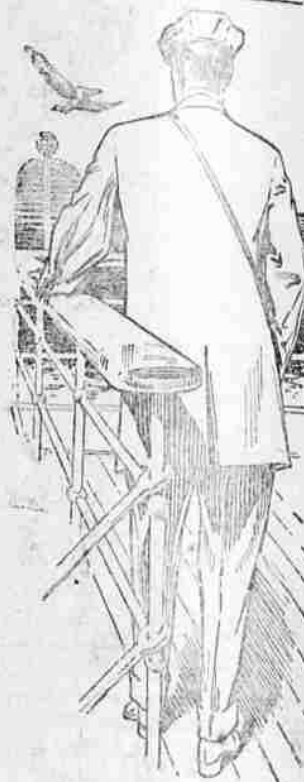
