Ten Rooms For Guests Being Added to the Rockefeller Mansion at a Cost of \$1,000,000.

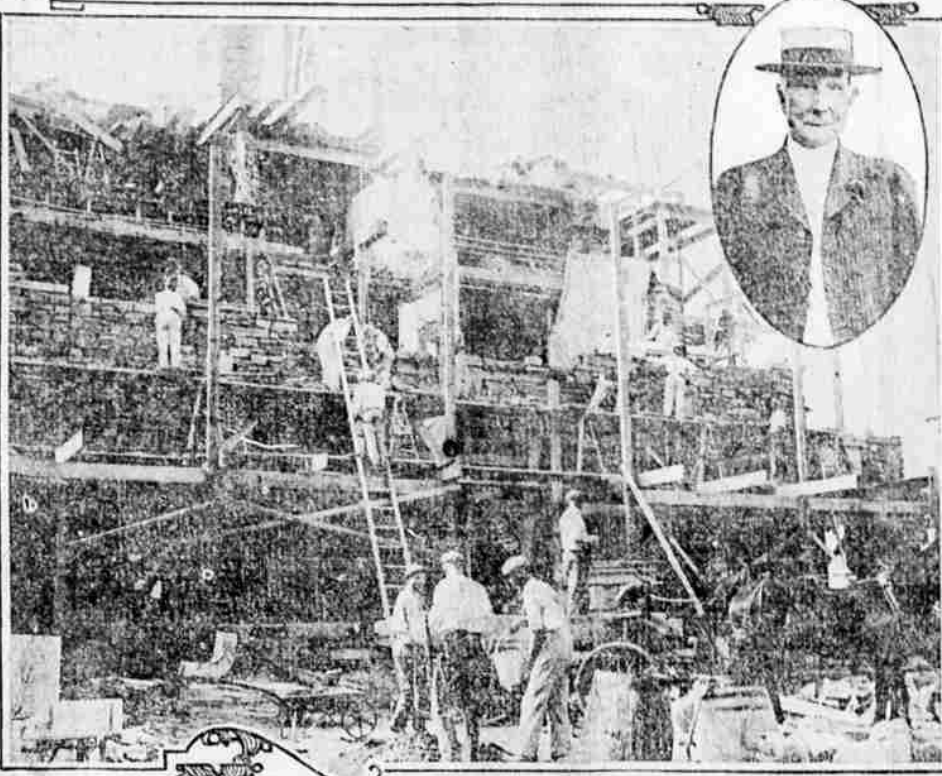

CENSUS FRAUDS IN TACOMA MAY INVOLVE HIGHER OFFICIALS

Tacoma, Sept. 21.—That new investigations of the Tacoma census frauds will be brought before the federal grand jury in a more comprehensive manner than ever before, is believed to be probable from the arrival from Washington of several hundred portfolios of the Tacoma census. It is said the present probe will involve higher officials who gave orders to enumerators.

COAL MINERS GET WAGE INCREASE

JUDGE GROSSCUP SAYS HE WILL TAKE ACTION TO VINDICATE HIMSELF

Chicago, Sept. 21.—United States Judge Grosscup announced today that he will not send in his resignation to the president until the threatened publication of charges and criticisms of his judicial career have been made and he will perhaps take action to vindicate himself.
