Train Load of Portland People Will Be Here Friday, Sept. 29.

Portland, Sept. 21.—Portland business men are looking forward eagerly to the coming Oregon excursion, run by the Portland Commercial club, south through the Willamette and Rogue river valleys to Klamath Falls. They are scanning the itinerary just made up and the only objection so far heard is the expressed wish that more time could be spent in the various cities along the way.

The trip will be made for the sole purpose of getting better acquainted and cementing more closely the friendly relations that obtain between Portland and all of western Oregon. That section of the state is growing so fast that Portland people feel that they must make frequent visits in order to keep in touch with it all. The different cities will greet the excursionists enroute and speed them on their way with good wishes. Campbell, of the State University, has invited the travelers to take lunch at the guests of the domestic science department of the institution, and this will be a pleasant feature of the trip. The excursion will leave Portland September 28, at 5:30 p. m., returning at 9:30 on the night of September 29.

## PARKISON IS AT SALEM TO EXPLAIN SIGNATURES

Salem, Or., Sept. 21.—H. J. Parkison, Harry Yanchewich and W. S. U'Ren, attorneys in the University referendum case, arrived in Salem at 11 o'clock today and are in conference with Attorney General Crawford, preparing an answer to the injunction suit brought against Secretary of State Olcott to prevent placing the referendum against the University appropriations on the ballot. The answer, which is to be filed soon, will be based on the theory that the conspiracy was directed against the promoters of the referendum for the purpose of undermining and defeating the referendum. It is thought that Parkison will plead inadvertently as an explanation of his own name appearing twice on each petition.

## SAYS PACIFIC GREAT WESTERN IS REALLY AN ALLY OF THE S. P.

Correspondent Hands Out Dope That is Not Generally Believed in Eugene.

The following from the Portland Journal, under a Florence date line, will be of interest, but it is not believed by many that the Willamette Pacific Railway company and the Southern Pacific company, have any connection, as mentioned in the story, which was presumably sent from the office of the morning paper in Eugene, as one of its employees sends news from various Lane county points to the Journal:

Florence, Or., Sept. 20.—The forthcoming visit of Manager J. P. O'Brien and other Southern Pacific officials gives rise to conjectures whether some statement will be given out regarding the building of the railroad from Eugene to Marshfield via this port, and more especially as to the relation of the Southern Pacific to the Pacific Great Western, which has been purchasing rights-of-way west of the crest of the coast range, and waterfront property at Mapleton.

Statements have been published in the Portland papers and elsewhere that the Pacific Great Western is blocking the Southern Pacific's plans for a coast road, in that it has fought rights-of-way in a number of the strategic points in the mountains, especially two tracts that control portions of the main tunnel on the Southern Pacific survey.

Still the story that the Southern Pacific is being blocked is not convincing here. For one thing, the accredited Southern Pacific agent has kept east of the pass entirely, and no known representatives of the Southern Pacific company have been in the Siuslaw valley. At the same time, the Pacific Great Western has been buying rights-of-way for the line 10 days or two weeks, to the public's knowledge, and it does not seem reasonable that the Southern Pacific company would sit idly by and allow important points to be gathered up by an enemy.

## WILL IS ATTACKED BY OREGON COUSIN

Cottage Grove Woman Avers Miss Jones of Chicago Not of Sound Mind.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 21.—A suit attacking the validity of the will of Susan E. Jones, who died June 29, 1910, leaving several charitable bequests, was filed in the circuit court here today by Sarah C. Jones of Cottage Grove, Or., her first cousin.

The will avers that Miss Jones, who left an estate valued at between \$10,000 and \$20,000, was 70 years old, sick and not of sound mind and memory at the time she executed the will. She left her estate largely to public institutions in Chicago and Marshall, Mich., and also to Chicago and Michigan people.
