The Creswell public schools opened Monday with a good attendance in all grades. Quite a number of scholars were not present on the opening day, but will enroll during the next week or two.

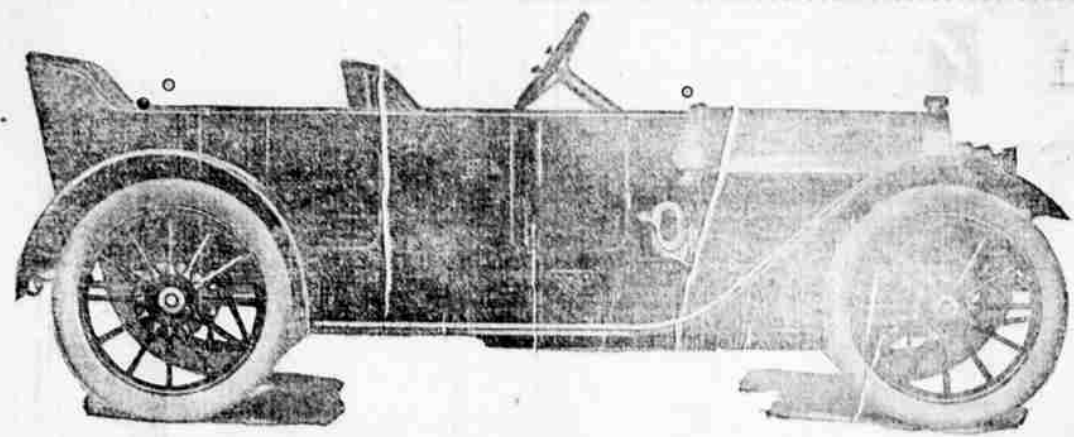

TWO MORE CONVICTS
ESCAPE FROM PEN

Salem, Sept. 21.—Availing himself of the liberties enjoyed as a trusty, George Davis, serving a sentence in the state penitentiary for grand larceny committed in Benton county Sunday evening broke into the tall shop of the institution and after stealing a suit of clothes, effected his escape by scaling the prison walls unobserved by the guards. Discovering the escape the next day, the prison authorities put the penitentiary blood hounds on his track and traced him as far south as the Southern Pacific depot, where the hounds refused longer to follow the scent.

Inquiries made at the state prison also developed the fact that another prisoner, Robert Owens, escaped Monday and that he has not yet been captured. Owens was sent up from Union county for grand larceny and was a trusty. He was employed in the brickyard, and some time during the forenoon of Monday, evidently becoming tired of his job, deliberately walked away.
