### BEAVERS SEEM ASSURED OF PENNANT

#### Vernon Drubbed Twice By Oakland In Columbus Day Games

Los Angeles, Oct. 13.—Two holiday games were played at Chutes park yesterday afternoon by Portland and Los Angeles, each club scoring a victory. The Angels won the first game, 5 to 1, the Beavers being unable to cope with the flinging of Palmer, a new Los Angeles pitcher. Stoen, for Portland, was ineffective. The Beavers won the second game 6 to 1, Tom Seaton pitching admirably for the visitors, who found "Lefty" Leverenz for plenty of hits.

### Pennant Seems Assured

Unless Portland suffers a tremendous slump—quite unlikely—and the Cubs win every game during the remainder of the season, McCredie will have the hunting in his sleeve when he goes back to the home folks. Both Portland and Vernon have still 11 scheduled league games to play. Should Portland win but four of the eleven, Vernon must win more than nine games to top the Beavers. The Beavers feel they are the 1911 champions.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—Outfielder Schulte of the Chicago Cubs, and Ty Cobb of the Detroit Tigers are today the winners of the automobiles offered for the player in each league adjudged by a "jury" of newspapermen to have been of the most service to his team during the 1911 season. The winner in each league was scored according to his general playing efficiency.

### U. OF O. SPORT GOSSIP

A University band was organized last evening at a meeting of the musicians of the college held at the Sitona Chi house. The organization will be under the leadership of Tom Hudson, a Portland student and an able director. The band will consist of about twenty pieces and will begin rehearsals immediately. An abundance of talent can be picked up around the campus this year, and by the time the football season opens in Eugene, the new organization will be heard. Burns Powell, the well-known trombone artist, will not have the time necessary to direct the band but possibly will be able to play with the boys. A complete list of the players will be published within a few days.

There will be no basketball game with Stanford University, as had been planned by Manager Leary in his southern trip for the team. Word was received yesterday from the California manager that Stanford will not have a basketball team this year to represent the 'Varsity, playing the game there only for gymnasium exercise and class teams. A game may be scheduled with a military team in San Francisco which played championship ball last year.

Every evening's scrimmage shows a much more encouraging outlook for the football team, than in the early part of the season. Latourette is almost back in his old time form and last night dotted the whole second eleven for a 40-yard run and touchdown. Bill Main was sent in to the scrimmage for the first time and played a smashing game, making yardage at will. Huesner and Walker both played scrappy ball in the other two backfield positions, and Caulfield, who has been playing center on the seconds, relieved Kellogg last night in that position on the first eleven. Kaiser, the California halfback, is being kept out of the game, on account of minor bruises, and although Ed Bailey is out in a suit, taking part in signal practice, the giant tackle is still nursing his twisted ankle. Fenton still continues on the wing position and Elmer Hall is playing a fast game in the tackle hole. The outlook is encouraging, to say the least.

### HENRY GEORGE, JR. COMING OCT. 16
