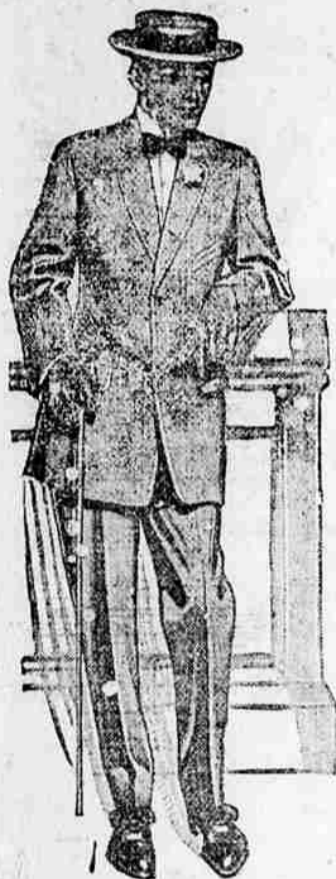

ATTEMPT TO STOP LIQUOR ELECTON

AT SPRINGFIELD Suit Brought in Circuit Court to Enjoin Recorder From Placing Question

In an endeavor to prevent the holding of the election in Springfield November 7, on the liquor question, a suit was filed in the circuit court today, seeking to restrain the recorder, John Mullen, from placing before the people the question of whether or not liquor shall be sold in Springfield.

The plaintiffs in the suit are L. Graham, J. I. Barbo, N. W. Emery, W. A. Pollard, D. Jordan, R. Miller, R. W. Smith and Z. T. Mountjoy. John C. Mullen, as recorder of the town of Springfield, is defendant.

The plaintiffs allege that the election, if held, will be null and void and will be a useless expense upon the taxpayers of the city.

The plaintiffs claim that the election will be void for the reason that the new home rule law does not apply to counties which have voted "dry," according to their belief, and inasmuch as Lane county voted in June, 1908, to prohibit the sale of liquor, to vote Springfield "wet" is useless as it is within "dry" territory.

The election, if held, will be on November 7, the same date as the regular city election. Williams & Bean are attorneys for the plaintiffs in the case.
