WOMAN BORN IN EUGENE RUNS FOR OFFICE OF MAYOR

Mrs. Clara A. Wright Is in Race at Davenport, Wash.-ington

Spokane, Wash.—Mrs. Clara A. Wright, 29 years of age, wife of H. C. Wright, a rural mail carrier at Davenport, Wash., has entered the mayoralty race in that city. The primaries will take place on November 7 and the election on December 5. George E. Craig, county superintendent of schools, is the other candidate for mayor. His name will appear on the independent ticket in the primaries. There is no contest on either ticket. Mrs. Wright was the first woman to file for office in Lincoln county since the state law for equal suffrage became effective. She is a native of Oregon, born at Eugene in 1882. She is the mother of three children. The oldest is five years of age, the youngest being a babe in arms. Mrs. Wright is a staunch advocate of woman's suffrage and is not dismayed in the least by the troublesome experiences of the woman mayor of Hunnewell, Kan., saying: "I am a candidate on the citizens' ticket, and if elected I shall give the city of Davenport a clean administration so far as it is possible for its mayor to direct."

MAKES A DENIAL

Editor Guard: In your issue of October 25th appeared an article under the caption "Recall of County Court is being Agitated Again." The heading of the article was the only semblance of truth in it. In the first place, there has never been a suspension of activity on the part of the taxpayers to free themselves from the burdens of excessive taxation, brought about by the mismanagement of our present county officers, but the apparent delay was necessitated by the law, which provides that a recall cannot be circulated until an officer has held his office for six months.

And secondly, the statement in the article referred to, that the people circulating the recall petitions

are trying to get signers on the representation that the county court was laying the sewers and paving the streets of Eugene with county money, is too absurd and ridiculous to even reply to, but it has been just such rot, as that statement, that has always been offered in defense of the present court and assessor for the purpose of diverting public attention from the issue before the taxpayers.

It is not necessary to indulge in any misrepresentations, for there are too many glaring facts to base our action on.

For instance, at the last general election, the taxpayers of Lane county voted over two to one on the proposition of bonding the county for the purpose of scientific road construction, but our august court absolutely refuses to recognize that fact, and instead have literally squandered nearly three hundred thousand dollars in wild-cat road building.

Again, the taxpayers of nearly every road district in the county have recommended to the county a suitable person in their respective districts for supervisor, but the court has invariably ignored those petitions, although in many cases they were almost unanimous, and has appointed its pets, against the earnest protest of the taxpayers.

Were I to give the thousand other reasons why the present court house star chamber ring should be dispensed with it would occupy too much space in your paper.

As for Keeney, at a great mass meeting of the taxpayers of Lane county held in the court house for the purpose of protesting against his erratic and unequal assessments, he openly dared the taxpayers to circulate a recall on him and at that time and place notified them that he would send many of them to the penitentiary for perjury, committed when they gave their assessment.

Now, the taxpayers have concluded, if he is a party to such transactions and has the knowledge of such falsification, that he is not a fit person to occupy a public office. The Lane County Protective Association, by

NEW \$80,000 CHURCH EDIFICE TO BE DEDICATED SUNDAY

The dedication ceremonies which mark the opening of the Christian church Sunday will usher into service one of the finest and most complete houses of worship on the Pacific coast.

The building is 148 feet long, 36 feet wide and 85 feet high to the top of the splendid dome and cost between \$75,000 and \$80,000. It is of reinforced concrete construction. Besides the large auditorium and gallery there are four large rooms for the second, third, fourth and fifth classes of the Sunday school, which can be thrown into the main body of the church by means of doors. Three of these rooms have galleries. The doors which shut off these rooms run on their own tracking and are fitted into pockets. There is a visitors' class room even with the gallery giving a splendid view of Sunday school work. The orchestra room and the pastor's study are also on the level of the gallery and the Sunday school rooms.

The baptistry is behind the speakers platform and in the plain view of all. There are two dressing rooms connected with the baptistry, one for men and one for women, with three booths in each. The choir loft is to the right of the speaker's platform and a little higher. There are sixty opera chairs in the choir.

The seats in the main gallery are quite as good and as desirable as those in the main auditorium, in fact they would be considered by many as more desirable.

Memorial Art Windows.

The art windows are things of beauty, and the finest work ever put out by Povey Brothers of Portland. In the main auditorium are six groups of double windows illustrative of the life of Christ, beginning with the Nativity and ending with the Crucifixion. In the gallery on the north side are three windows, the center one containing a picture of the ascension and the side ones an adoring angel, the three forming a group. In the east end are five fine art windows, the center one being Christ the light of the world, another Christ blessing the children and another the last supper.

On the south side the three windows represent Christ in the garden, the resurrection and gates ajar.

The building is lighted by reflection and the lights do not appear. The center reflector in the dome is of more than 1600 candle power, diffusing light through colored glass, a patent by the noted inventor named Frink of New York City. The acoustical properties of the building are excellent.

Kitchen and Dining Room
The basement is fully equipped and

splendidly arranged. There is a large kitchen and large dining room, a physical exercise room, a lounge, reading room, basket ball room, shower bath and a department for a private primary school.

The edifice is heated with hot air furnace, there is a large engine room and an electric fan for the purpose of securing ventilation, the air in the room being changed entirely every twenty minutes when desired. On the dome is a large glass cross which will be lighted with electricity during service or other sessions, and which is so arranged that it appears as a cross from any part of the city.

The seats were made in Williamsport, Penn., and were made to conform to the general color scheme, which is a dark shade of oak. A place is prepared for the installing of a pipe organ. Until the purchase of the organ, the niche for the pipes is hidden with panels colored in harmony with the furniture and the woodwork. The building will seat at least 1800 people comfortably.
