SPRINGFIELD GOES 'WET' BY 30 MAJORITY

**Election Yesterday Was a Close
Race—Welby Stevens Re-
Elected Mayor**

Guard Special Service.
Springfield, Nov. 8.—After an interesting campaign marked by intensity but without personality, the "wets" carried Springfield at yesterday's election by a majority of 30, the vote standing 213 "wet" to 183 "dry." The contest was unique of its kind from the beginning on account of the determination of all parties to have a friendly contest on the merits of the issue at stake. As pointed out in The Guard correspondence at the time, the "wets" and the "drys" began agreeing to nominate a compromise ticket representing both parties, said ticket to be composed partly of "wets" and partly of "drys." The candidates upon this ticket were to abide by the result of the election and the determination of the courts upon its validity. Of course, in a contest of that sort an absolute elimination of friction was not possible but it was reduced to the smallest possible amount, and there are no more spots after the contest. As further intimated in these columns at that time, the socialist vote was larger than might have been expected by superficial observers and the statement that they would have shown up well in the percentage of votes cast, were it not for the fact that the liquor fight brought out a full vote, was fully borne out by the returns. The total vote cast was 499, a decided increase over all previous elections. The entire vote of the town was not cast, as a small percentage of the people who looked upon prohibition as the sole issue and could not make up their minds which way to vote, stayed away from the polls altogether.

Will be Taken to Court.
The matter will naturally be carried through the courts to its final determination at the polls. Attorney Frank A. DePue, in behalf of the home rulers, filed his answer to the prohibition petition to declare against the election Monday evening and the decision will be handed down in due time. Whether the prohibitionists will decide to resort to injunction to prevent the opening of saloons during the pendency of the case, or whether they will let the case take its regular course, has not been authoritatively declared but it is likely that an injunction will be invoked. This will expedite the final decision.

Chas. Rivett made a splendid race

for councilman, considering the fact that he ran as an independent, and though defeated by a small majority, has every reason to be proud of his vote.

ROSEBURG NEAR-BEER JOINTS ARE RAIDED BY THE SHERIFF

**Two Wagon Loads of Beverages
Confiscated and Proprietors
Are Arrested**

Roseburg, Or., Nov. 8.—Suspecting that liquor was sold in Roseburg in direct violation of the local option laws, Sheriff Quinn, assisted by eight deputies, yesterday afternoon raided five near-beer resorts and confiscated nearly two wagonloads of beverages. Following the raid, which included places conducted by Landford Gronvold, of the McCallen Hotel; Ben North, Robert Connors, Sam Rast and Edward Tryin, the proprietors were arrested. The confiscated liquors were hauled to the county jail, where the stock is stored awaiting inspection by the grand jury tomorrow.

The raid was pulled off at a time when the bars are usually lined with thirsty laborers returning home from work. The sheriff summoned his deputies to the courthouse at 3 o'clock and surprised them of the contemplated action.

Armed with search warrants, the deputies were later stationed about the city in twos, and at the signal they entered the resorts and placed the proprietors under arrest. Caught without a chance to escape, the proprietors surrendered without resistance, whereupon the doors were locked and the search for liquors began. In every resort visited, it is said, both beer and whisky were found in large quantities.

The objects as given in the articles of incorporation are to engage in a general contracting and mercantile business, to do a general plumbing, fitting and sheet metal business. It is interesting to note that the articles were sworn to by H. J. Parkison, at notary public, who attended to the circulation of the University of Oregon referendum petitions and who now appears to be mixed up in the frauds connected with them.
